About Dr. Carpenter

Dr. Will D. Carpenter retired from Monsanto Company in 1992 as Vice President and General Manager of the New Products Division after 34 Years with the company. From 1992 through 1994, he served as Chairman of the Board of Directors of Agridyne Technologies, Inc., and from 1992 to 1995 as Executive in Residence at Mississippi State University. He is currently on the Board of Aetos Technologies, Inc.



Dr. Carpenter joined Monsanto in 1958 as a research biochemist after earning his PhD in Plant Physiology from Purdue University. In 1961, he became Project Supervisor for herbicide development in Monsanto's Agricultural Division. After serving as Manager of herbicide development, in 1969 he was named Director, Market Development, and played key roles in defining and implementing the company's strategy as well as developing and bringing to market a number of products including Acetanilides and Roundup. These products were the basis for Monsanto Company to be the most successful agricultural products company in the world for more than twenty years. In 1980, he was named Director, Environmental Operations for the corporate Environmental Policy Staff, serving as Monsanto's principle spokesman in the environmental arena.

In 1984, he returned to the Agricultural Products Company as General Manager, Technology and was then named Vice President, and Chairman of the Corporate Biotechnology Strategy Committee. Dr. Carpenter was deeply involved in the efforts to obtain a worldwide chemical weapons treaty from 1988 through 2003. After the convention was ratified and put into force, he was named by the United States as the U.S. Representative to the Science Advisory Board to the Organization for Prohibition of Chemical Weapons and was named Co-Chair of the Board. From 1979 to 1994, he served as the Chair of the Chemical Manufacturers Association Tray Committee and served as a representative and resource to the United States, NATO, and the United Nations. In 1992, Dr. Carpenter was awarded the Hilliard Roderick Prize and Medal in Science, Arms Control, and International Security.

In other activities, he was an advisor to the U.S. House of Representatives on the House Science and Technology Subcommittee and to the Office of Technology Assessment of Congress. He was a member of the Keystone National Advisory Committee for Biotechnology, and a founding Board member of the World Agricultural Forum. He served on the Mississippi State University Foundation Board, and on the Purdue Science Advisory Board. He is a past member of the Board of Trustees of the St. Louis Science Center, and the Board of the St. Louis Academy Science. He also served in several capacities in professional organizations, including President and Fellow of the Weed Science Society of America and for the North Central Weed Conference. He was the founder of the University-Industry Consortium, composed of over 20 Land Grant Institutions and a dozen major companies.

His undergraduate alma mater, Mississippi State University, has recognized his efforts by awarding him the Agricultural Achievement Award in 1987, Alumni of the year in Agriculture in 1997, and in 2003 he was named the National Alumni of the year, and awarded an Honorary Doctorate in 2005. Purdue University named him the School of Science Distinguished Alumni in 1990, and awarded in Honorary Doctorate in 1999. In 2005, Gamma Sigma Delta, the International Honor Society of Agriculture, awarded Dr. Carpenter the International Award for Distinguished Achievement in Agriculture.

He is currently Chair of the Advisory Council for the college of Arts and Sciences of the University of Missouri—St. Louis, the Advisory Board for the College of Arts and Sciences of Webster University, and for the city of Chesterfield. Dr. Carpenter is a native of Moorhead, Mississippi. He served in the Naval Reserve from the age of 17 to 20, and saw active duty in the U.S. Army in Korea from 1952 through 1954. He was discharged from the active reserve with the rank of Captain in 1961. He and his wife, Hellen, live in Chesterfield, MO, and have two children, Celeste St John and Will A. Carpenter.

About the Presenters

Our Keynote Presenter, Dorothy F. Edwards, PhD, is an Experimental Psychologist and Professor of Kinesiology, Occupational Therapy, Neurology and Medicine, at the University of Wisconsin at Madison. She received her PhD from Washington University in 1980 and spent much of her career there in the Medical School before moving to Wisconsin in 2006. At UW – Madison, she serves as Chair of the Department of Kinesiology, and Minority Outreach Core Leader of the Wisconsin Alzheimer's Disease Research Center (WADRC) and Co-Core Leader of the WADRC Education Core. She and her colleagues employ neurological, neuropsychological, occupational performance and outcomes research methods to explore the effects of cognitive impairment and racial disparities in adults with stroke and Alzheimer's disease. She is especially interested in the contribution of cognition to independence in complex life activities in these patient groups. Dr. Edwards was inducted in 2012 into the American Occupational Therapy Foundation's *Academy of Research in Occupational Therapy* for her exceptional portfolio of research on cognitive aging.

Panelist, Steve H. Jones, PhD, is a Cultural Anthropologist and Associate Professor of Social Work, Criminal Justice, and Gerontology, at Murray State University in Murray, Kentucky. Dr. Jones served as Chair of the Department of Social Work, Criminal Justice, and Gerontology from 2002-2012. His research interests include urban anthropology, applied anthropology, and experiences of the Black Family with respect to health (HIV/AIDS), inclusion and quality of life. He received his PhD from Washington University in 1981, and he is pleased to be back in St. Louis for this evening's program.

Panelist, B. Joy Snider, MD, PhD, is a Specialist Physician and an Associate Professor of Neurology at Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis. Her research explores how neurons die in neurodegenerative disorders (e.g., Alzheimer's disease) and stroke, with a specific focus on how abnormally folded proteins, such as amyloid b-peptide and polyglutamine-containing proteins, cause neuronal death. She sees patients at the Memory Diagnostic Center and participates in research studies at the Knight Alzheimer's Disease Research Center. Dr. Snider attended the Medical Scientist Training Program at the University of Texas Southwestern Medical Center at Dallas where she completed her M.D. and Ph.D. (in Biochemistry) in 1989.

Panelist, Yakima Young-Shields, EdD(c), MSN, APRN, BC, ANP, is an Adult Nurse Practitioner and a Teaching Assistant Professor of Nursing at UMSL, where she also serves as APN Emphasis Area Coordinator. An active educator and mentor, Ms. Young-Shields teaches both undergraduate and graduate nursing students how to assess, diagnose and manage adult and geriatric health problems. She maintains an active clinical practice, seeing patients as a nurse practitioner, and is committed to evidence-based practice. Her clinical interests include diabetes, hypertension, obesity, and autoimmune disorders. She received her MSN from UMSL and will soon complete her Doctorate in Education here.

Moderator, Thomas M. Meuser, PhD, is a Clinical Psychologist and an Associate Professor of Gerontology and Social Work at UMSL. He serves as Director of the Gerontology Program and Coordinator of the UMSL Life Review Project. His research interests include loss and grief in aging, older driver safety, evaluation of at-risk drivers, and narrative gerontology. Dr. Meuser was named a Fellow of the Gerontological Society of America in 2011.

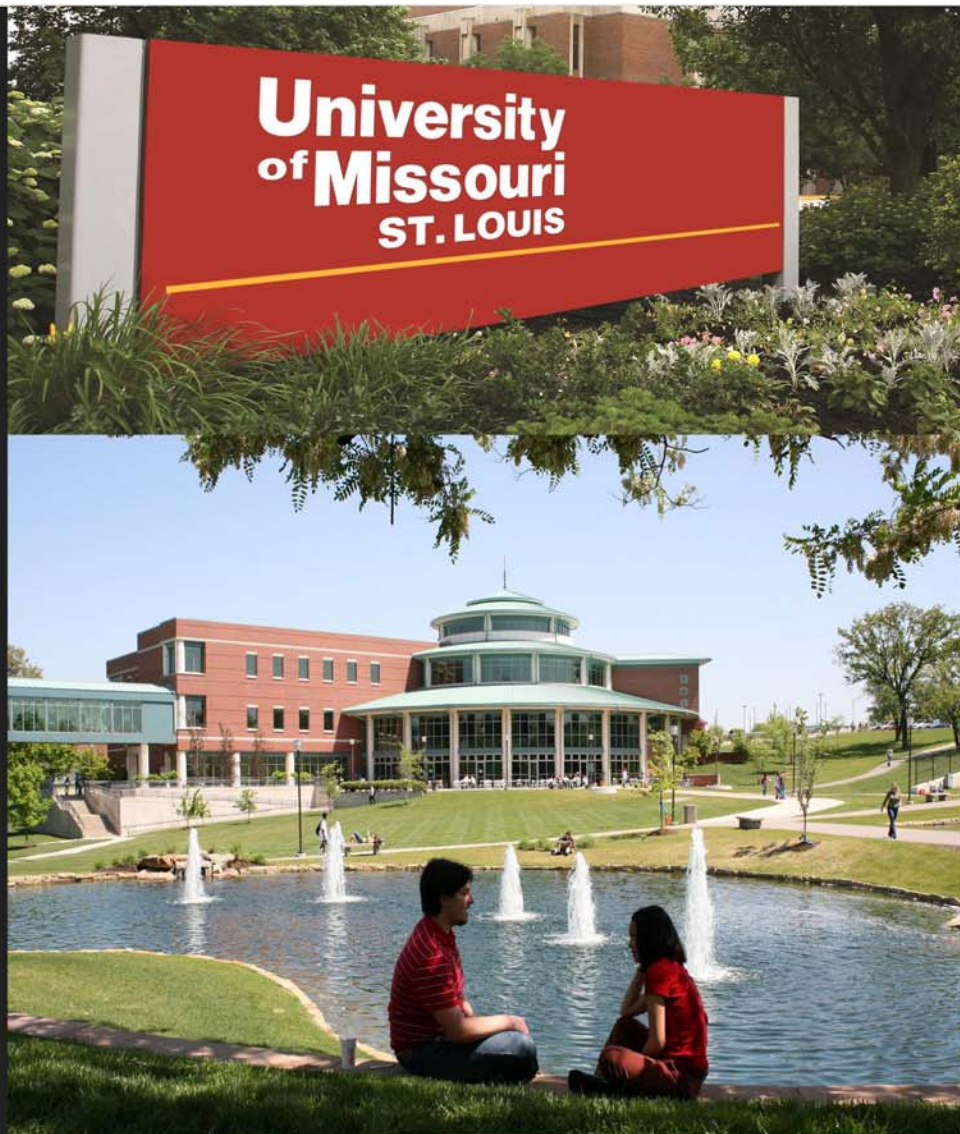
