RETIREMENT

Dr. Sam Marwit has retired after over 37 years of service to the University and the Department. He arrived on campus when there were only two buildings, and has been instrumental in the growth and direction of the Psychology Department. He was one of the first Directors of the Counseling Center and was a key person in planning and creating a Clinical Psychology Ph.D. program. He was a member of the committee that wrote the Missouri Statue for licensing and has been active in the community on matters of grief and bereavement for clergy, teachers and physicians. He has published extensively on grief and end of life issues, is on the editorial board of two prominent journals in the field and has mentored a number of graduate students. He has been a most valuable member of the Department, and we wish him well in his new endeavors.

NEW FACULTY

We are fortunate to have four outstanding new faculty who will be joining the Department in fall 2006.

Dr. Barbara Bucur will be joining the newly named Behavioral Neuroscience group in the fall. She is completing a three year post doc at the Center for the Study of Aging and Human Development at Duke Medical School. She received her Ph.D. from Akron University in cognitive psychology and her research focuses on issues at the intersection of gerontology and cognitive science. Her most recent research, using neuroimaging, examines the relationship between brain activity and psychological functioning in the elderly.

Dr. Laurie Greco will join the Clinical area and bring expertise in the child clinical area. Dr. Greco received her Ph.D. from University of West Virginia and has spent the last several years as Assistant Professor of Pediatrics and Psychology at Vanderbilt Children's Hospital. Dr. Greco completed an internship in pediatric psychology at Cincinnati Children's Hospital Medical Center and will bring much needed expertise in this area to the Department. Her research focuses on the use and efficacy of Acceptance and Commitment Therapy for adolescents suffering from physical and emotional pain.

Dr. Robert Paul graduated from a joint Ph.D. program at Oklahoma State University and the University of Oklahoma Health Sciences Center in clinical psychology (with a biobehavioral emphasis) and neurophysiology. He has spent the last several years at Brown Medical School as a post doc and more recently as an Assistant Professor. His research interests address issues in clinical neuropsychology, including psychological impairment in

HIV patients. He has received substantial grant awards, including a K-award, given to promising young researchers. He will join the newly named Behavioral Neuroscience group.

Dr. Matthew Taylor, a graduate of our Clinical Program (Ph.D., 1997), will be rejoining the Clinical area, this time as a new faculty member. Dr. Taylor has been on the faculty at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse since 1999, first as an Assistant then Associate Professor and twice received "Outstanding Professor of the Year Award." Dr. Taylor brings his teaching expertise and his research interests in multicultural issues to the Department. His research includes Native American health issues, substance abuse, domestic violence and delinquency in rural minority populations and risk and resiliency issues in minority youth.

NOTES FROM THE CHAIR

This has been an exciting year for the department. Three new faculty members joined us in Fall 2006. Four additional faculty members will join us in Fall 2007 (see related story). All three of our doctoral programs continue to produce outstanding professionals in their respective specialty areas (see related stories). I am also proud of the quality research and service that is provided by our three mental health clinics: Community Psychological Services, Center for Trauma Recovery, and Children's Advocacy Services of Greater St. Louis. This past year the Department also made major changes in its undergraduate curriculum, including the addition of a new "Careers in Psychology" course and a capstone course which will help students prepare for the Major Field Test required for all graduating seniors and the Psychology Subject Test of the Graduate Record Exam. A new Psychology Undergraduate Advising Office, under the direction of Dr. Jennifer Siciliani, was opened and provides career and other advising for our 640 undergraduate majors. The Psychology Alumni Association, under the direction of Dr. Laura Heft, also undertook a number of new initiatives this year. I know that Laura and her colleagues on the alumni board are open to any ideas that you may have regarding: (1) alumni events, (2) fund raising, and (3) improving communication. Also, please send Jean Mayo information about your current professional and family accomplishments, so that we can include that information in next year's Newsletter. In closing, I want to thank all of you who have made financial contributions to the Department over the years. APA EARLY CAREER AWARD

Dr. Dean Klinkenberg (Ph.D 1995) has been selected by Division 12 (Clinical Psychology) of APA as the 2006 recipient of the *Ted Blau Early Career Award for Outstanding Contributions to Clinical Psychology*. This award is given to a clinical psychologist who has made an outstanding contribution to the profession of Clinical Psychology within the first 10 years of receiving their doctorate. Dr. Klinkenberg is Associate Professor at the Missouri Institute of Mental Health. He has been the principal Investigator for nine federal research grants, most of which were focused on HIV/AIDS, Co-Investigator or Project Evaluator for twelve federal research grants, authored 39 peer reviewed publications (14 as first author), served on four NIH study sections and has been a reviewer for a number of prominent journals in the field. Congratulations!

DIRECTOR OF CLINICAL TRAINING

After more than 25 years as Director of Clinical Training, **Dr. Jayne Stake** has turned the reigns over to **Dr. Ann Steffen**. Dr. Stake has guided the program through several successful APA site visits, advocated forcefully for the program within the University, the St. Louis community, and at the national level, assisted numerous graduate students with a wide array of issues and problems, and effectively managed the program on matters large and small for a quarter of a century. She leaves the program in good order on the eve of the upcoming APA site visit.

CLINICAL PROGRAM

Dr. Ann Steffen is now the Director of Clinical Training and has been instrumental in submitting materials for the upcoming APA site visit. BEHAVIORAL NEUROSCIENCE PROGRAM

The Experimental Program has officially changed its name to the Behavioral Neuroscience Program. The reason for the name change is that neuroscience is the future of experimental psych, and resources can be focused on a single topic area that also intersects with interests shared with other colleagues in the Department, including psychophysiology of trauma victims, the biological bases of anxiety, and neuropsychopharmacology. As described elsewhere in the Newsletter, Dr. Robert Paul and Dr. Barbara Bucur will be joining the Behavioral Neuroscience area. We are proud of our new graduates over the past year. This has included three Ph.D. graduates. **Catherine Creeley** (PhD, May '05) is now working on a post-doctoral fellowship in neuropsychiatry at Washington Univ. Med. School. **Carla Yuede** (PhD, May '06) will also begin a post-doctoral fellowship at Washington Univ. Med. School. **Melissa Bleile** (PhD, May '06) has been teaching in the psychology department at Maryville Univ. Recent graduates with M.A. degrees from the behavioral neuroscience program include **Jolie Facciolini**, **Peter Leo** and **Sara Rechiene Conyers**.

CHILDREN'S ADVOCACY CENTER

The Children's Advocacy Center has undergone major changes this past year. It is now directly administered by the Psychology Department, creating a closer link for teaching, training and service for faculty and students. **Dr. Jerry Dunn** (Ph.D., 2002), a graduate of the Clinical Program, has been hired as the new Director of the Center. Under her leadership treatment services have been expanded to traumatized children regardless of the type of trauma, new group treatments are offered, productive

contacts with state legislators forged and grants for nearly \$1 millions dollars submitted.

CENTER FOR TRAUMA RECOVERY

The Center for Trauma Recovery has submitted several grants to obtain funding for the ongoing assessment and treatment of physical and sexual abuse victims. One grant proposes to examine the potential genetic influences that may impact successful psychotherapy. An additional study is underway that examines the effects of the legal system response on the reduction or exacerbation of traumatic stress symptoms in sexual assault victims. Finally, another study has been submitted for funding that proposes to examine the effectiveness of an aggressive driving protocol to reduce overall levels of road rage. If effective, this study may hold promise to reduce the number of individuals victimized by traumatic incidences of road rage."

COMMUNITY PSYCHOLOGICAL SERVICE

CPS rejoined the St. Louis Psychology Internship Consortium this year, providing both a major and a minor rotation for consortium interns. The current professional staff includes a psychologist, post-doctoral fellow, two interns and eight grad students. A third Charter school was added to assessment contracts and a contract for treatment services with St. Louis City Family Court was also secured. Over the past few years, all the computers have been networked allowing for electronic intakes and assessment scheduling. Pat Jones still keeps the ship running smoothly as she has for 23 years!

FACULTY ACTIVITIES

Dr. Bob Calsyn had four articles published last year. His research focuses on evaluating the effectiveness of treatments for clients with severe mental illness, particularly those who have other co-occurring problems, such as low income, substance abuse, HIV, and homelessness.

Dr. Thomas Fletcher received a developmental leave award to develop instructional materials (i.e., videos and software) to accompany two graduate courses. He recently published a paper in *Journal of Computer-Mediated Communication*, "The effects of communication modality on performance and self-ratings of teamwork components," and presented a paper at the annual meeting of the Society for Industrial and Organizational Psychologists, "On the use of partial covariances in structural equation modeling".

Dr. Tara Galovski was promoted to Associate Research Psychologist for her contributions to the Center for Trauma Recovery. Dr. Galovski is author of a recent book, *Road Rage: Assessment and Treatment of the Angry, Aggressive Driver*.

Dr. Michael Griffin had an article published in the *American Journal of Psychiatry*, "Enhanced cortisol suppression following dexamethasone administration in domestic violence survivors." He also gave four presentations at the annual meeting of the International Society for Traumatic Stress Studies in November 2005 in Toronto including a

paper on "Psychophysiological Changes Following Treatment for PTSD."

Dr. Therese Macan received the Psychology Alumni "Outstanding Faculty Award" in May. She is a valued teacher, a productive researcher and a key person in the success of the I/O program, and much deserving of the award. Dr. Therese Macan coauthored an article "Improving applicant reactions by altering test administration", published in *Applied H.R.M. Research*, and presented three papers with others at the Society for Industrial and Organizational Psychology meeting in Dallas this May.

Dr. Miles Patterson is co-editor on the *The Sage Handbook of Nonverbal Communication* that will be published later this summer. It's a comprehensive scholarly overview of the field with 26 chapters written by experts from psychology and communication. Dr. Patterson has been invited to Japan this June to present talks on nonverbal communication at different campuses.

Dr. Jennifer Siciliani was promoted to Associate Teaching Professor after 5 years of teaching excellence for the Department. She also is responsible for developing the new Undergraduate Advising Office that serves our 640 majors and has assumed the responsibilities as Director.

Dr. Jayne Stake, as new Editor of *The Psychology of Women Quarterly*, published the first volume under her direction, with the assistance of graduate students **Heather Eisele** and **Erin Wessling**. Dr Stake also published several articles addressing the value of gender equity programs and social encouragement for the development of girls' confidence and motivation to pursue challenging careers in science. This research appeared in various journals including the *Journal of Research in Science Teaching*; *Sex Roles*; *Journal of Applied Social Psychology*; and *Science Education Review*.

Dr. Ann Steffen, Ph.D. is currently in the middle of a longitudinal study of a new intervention to reduce depression in dementia family caregivers sponsored by the National Alzheimer's Association. She is also involved in a Housing and Urban Development Grant that targets Affton, Missouri focusing on needs assessment and community development activities to help older adults successfully age in place. She is the recipient of the 2006 Kathleen O'Brien Lifetime Achievement Award from the St. Louis Alzheimer's Association

Dr. George Taylor, with graduate **Dr. Catherine Creeley**, published an article "Low doses of memantine disrupt memory in adult rats" in the *Journal of Neuroscience*. He also coauthored an article with another recent graduate, **Dr. Carla Yuede**, " Behaviorally timid rats respond differentially to conventional and atypical neuroleptics" in *Pharmacology, Biochemistry & Behavior*.

Dr. Brian Vandenberg is a coauthor with grad student, **Shawn O'Connor**, of an article "Psychosis or faith? Clinicians' assessment of religious beliefs", which appeared in the *Journal of Consulting and Clinical Psychology*. He also authored an article on "Magical Thinking" in *The Encyclopedia of Human Development*.

Dr. Kamila White coauthored a paper examining "Anxiety and psychosocial stress as predictors of headache and abdominal pain in urban early adolescents" in the *Journal of Pediatric Psychology*. Dr. White was interviewed about this research for a feature in *Prevention* magazine.
