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#### REPORT FROM THE SENATE COMMITTEE ON BYLAWS AND RULES

## August 26, 1994

#### PROPOSED NEW OPERATING RULES

- 1. Only voting members of the Senate may vote at meetings of the Senate. Proxy voting is prohibited.
- 2. Only voting members of Senate committees may vote at committee meetings. Proxy voting is prohibited.

#### RATIONALE

The proposed new rules formalize a long-standing Senate policy. Individuals who are elected to serve on the Senate and/or on Senate committees should be the ones participating in decision-making and casting votes. Monitoring the validity of proxy voting would be cumbersome.
