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## FOREWORD:

This bibliographical checklist serves as a guide to an extremely important early Midwestern frontier private library, still extant, as preserved by the St. Louis Mercantile Library Association. Long known locally with much pride as a true jewel of the special collections of this institution since its acquisition in the 1850's, the Peck Library has received little attention in recent generations nationally.

This becomes ironic when one considers the heightened attention given in recent years by scholars to the history of libraries, bibliographical analyses of all sorts, as well as to interdisciplinary studies focusing on the history of books and readership patterns and tastes. One of the problems in approaching the Peck Collection, it was felt by library staff, has been the lack of detailed cataloguing and an enumerative list of book and manuscript holdings. This guide, in part, redresses this problem and it is hoped that opportunities for the detailed study, analysis and better understanding of the significance of this collection will be furthered by its creation. There is much potential in these materials for investigation of nineteenth century printing history, American intellectual history, the missionary zeal of American religious denomination on the frontier, of which John Mason Peck was synonymous in his time, among many other subjects.

What follows brings together for the first time in an available publication full bibliographical descriptions of this important frontier intellectual's books, which range over the widest field of knowledge that could possibly be available to a Baptist clergyman living in the Illinois countryside of the 1820's -1840's. Also listed in detail are hundreds of pamphlets and ephemeral items which were part of Peck's library at one time, but which were previously uncatalogued or housed within the general Mercantile Library collections and not kept physically with what became known as the Peck Collection.

Added to these lists are other materials which have for the first time been identified formally as Peck-related materials in anticipation of further description and original cataloguing, as well as bound manuscripts and important, annotated pieces. This Guide has dramatically enlarged the size of the collection through detailed examination of the Mercantile Library stacks. The scope and range of intellectual pursuits and inquiry present in Peck's mind have been focused in greater detail through these lists. In short, the Guide to the John Mason Peck Collection attempts to reconstruct an early frontier library, the parameters of which ~ have never before been outlined.

The Guide was produced as a segment of the National Endowment for the Humanities funded effort which made possible between 1987- 1989 provisions for greater access to the Archives and selected large research collections in the holdings of the Mercantile Library. For this assistance the Board of Direction, Trustees and staff of this institution make grateful acknowledgment.

As the NEH Project progressed through succeeding stages, we realized that Mercantile Library staff was not only learning about the significance and depth of recent large acquisitions of research materials on various subjects - notably collections related to transportation history - but of much older collections as well, such as the John Mason Peck Library, to say nothing of the historic archival collections of the Mercantile Library itself.

The Mercantile Library wishes to express its thanks and appreciation to several individuals who, either as part of the NEH Access Project staff or as enthusiastic and helpful "bystanders," gave much time and effort towards a completed project and guide which show every indication of allowing researchers to exploit much more easily these newly arranged and described materials: Betsy Stoll, who, as Project Archivist compiled much information for the Guide up to final draft levels; Robert Behra, former Cataloguer, St. Louis Mercantile Library Association, and Judith Hubbard, Cataloguer, St. Louis Mercantile Library Association, both of whose advice and help have enabled the initially targeted portion of this material - Peck's books - to be fully described and available immediately on the OCLC online bibliographical database for researchers nationwide. The extra help of Administrative secretaries, Janet Lehan and Jerry Pabst, was enormous in the efficient and accurate production of copy text. ## INTRODUCTION: A MAN OF LETTERS ON THE FRONTIER AND HIS LIBRARY.

In the spring of 1854, a circular signed by John Mason Peck of Rockspring, Illinois, appeared reading in part, as follows: "For many years the undersigned [Peck] has been engaged in collecting books, pamphlets, newspapers, reports of philanthropic societies of a general and denominational character, for a library. His main object has been to obtain materials of every kind to aid in developing the history and characteristics of the central portion of the United States."<sup>1</sup>

As John T. Flanagan has commented on this book collecting effort, Peck (1789-1858)<sup>2</sup>, pioneer, Baptist missionary, writer, and journalist on the early Missouri and Illinois frontier, who had written many important books and articles by 1850, had for years planned a definitive work for the country's Western regions entitled "Moral Progress of the Great Central Valley of the Western World."<sup>3</sup>

This ambitious book was never written, but glimpses of the effort Peck made in gathering the primary materials he would need to produce it, including his own writings, papers, and publications, as well as that of friends, themselves key figures in the history of the Mississippi Valley, do exist.

Enough evidence through these accounts survives to give testimony that Peck's library in 1852, the time of a disastrous fire which decimated the collection,<sup>4</sup> was one of the most important in Illinois or indeed within the expanse of the entire American frontier of his day. Long or complete runs of the region's newspapers from the beginning of printing in the region, religious tracts, learned and benevolent society reports, early laws, serials of all kinds, correspondence, hundreds of books on shelves and in storage--all were owned by Peck, along with detailed, well-preserved files of his own articles in dozens of publications. Peck estimated that his files of pamphlets and newspapers had numbered by the 1850's between 8000-10,000 individual items, an extraordinary sum of books for the library of a private or even public collection in the relatively isolated southern Illinois of that time.

After this fire, Peck set about rebuilding his collection to its former strength. In poor health towards his death in 1858, he nevertheless continued to correspond, write, and travel for this and the many other scholarly, religious, and educational purposes which were the bench marks of his long career of achievement. Peck met with some measure of success in the recreation of his library. Along with his books and pamphlets, which had survived the fire at Rockspring, many of his notebooks

and other papers had been preserved. The evidence of the success of these endeavors can be judged in the lists which follow of extant material still in existence at the Mercantile Library.

Peck's life may be outlined briefly as follows: Born in Litchfield, Connecticut, in October, 1789,<sup>6</sup> Peck grew up on a farm in the surrounding countryside. As a young man due to his growing conviction that Baptist missionary work was his true calling, Peck, ordained in New York in 1813,<sup>7</sup> traveled to St. Louis where he established that city's earliest Baptist mission.

In constant communication with religious and benevolent societies in the East, Peck became convinced early in his career that schooling was woefully inadequate in the rapidly developing territories of the Old Northwest and the Louisiana Purchase. Traveling, preaching, writing, and planning "indefatigably" as virtually all contemporary sources characterized him,<sup>8</sup> Peck eventually founded Rockspring Seminary about 18 miles from St. Louis in St. Clair County, Illinois. Moving to Upper Alton, Illinois, and eventually becoming Shurtleff College through bequests Peck solicited personally from Benjamin Shurtleff and others, this school was once of Peck's most significant achievements and contributions on the frontier -becoming as it did the first college in Illinois.

Peck's published emigrant guides and especially his Gazetteer of Illinois form a portion of the cornerstone primary printed literature of the state and region. Concerning the latter, Peck's many travels from hamlet to hamlet in the Illinois and Missouri of his day gradually gave the author much background on the pioneer history of the region. These writings benefit from Peck's keen observation concerning frontier life in general.

In his own books and those of colleagues, Peck encouraged the gathering of primary accounts and descriptive materials that he knew would be lost otherwise. His understanding of history and historical analysis and method was much appreciated in his own time as well as in later periods. Jared Sparks, for instance, the most important biographer of Washington in the early republic and later President of Harvard University, published Peck's important biography of Daniel Boone in the classic American Biography Series. Later, in 1852, Sparks bestowed upon Peck an honorary doctorate (in Systematic Theology) from Harvard in a ceremony which also gave Alexis de Tocqueville an honorary degree (Doctorate of Laws).

Peck worked tirelessly to publicize and promote settlement and settled institutions along the frontier. His friends on both sides of the Mississippi whom he marshalled into service for this end create an impressive list; early Illinois political figures, (" Edward Coles, John Reynolds, Ninian Edwards, and Sidney Breese.

Religious figures such as Peter Cartwright and Elijah Lovejoy and many others were acquainted with Peck, as were Daniel Boone and Abraham Lincoln. It was said that Peck "was a master spirit along the pioneers... Perhaps no man of his class did more than he to guide the thoughts, mold the manners, and form the institutions of the West. "10

Records in the Mercantile Library show Peck's strong support of "cultural institutions." Peck was a charter member of various early libraries for example, such as the St. Louis Library Association and later, the St. Louis Lyceum. Peck gave frequent lectures on behalf of education and schooling in early St. Louis. A major lecture by Peck at the Mercantile Library occurred in 1853. At that time Peck expounded on his favorite theme of the progress and development of the Mississippi Valley, as presented from a pioneer's (his own) perspective.

As a book collector - indeed one could characterize him along with several other contemporaries such as Lymon C. Draper - and as an early Americanist of the first rank, Peck energetically built a huge library. Glimpses of sources which Peck had gathered may be seen in a short, chronologically arranged catalogue he submitted in 1843 to *The American Pioneer*. Descriptions of his library at Rockspring before the tragic 1852 fire emphasize his wish to collect printed sources he would need to write his master work, an ecclesiastical, political and intellectual record of the western United States at mid-century. The 1854 circular quoted above was an effort to rebuild much of this collection through correspondence and travel - travel being second nature to such a tireless frontier circuit rider. By 1853 he had replaced a significant portion of his runs of annual reports of many benevolent societies, churches, missionary groups, and philanthropic organizations.<sup>12</sup> Thus, with the salvaged portion of Peck's original library intact, coupled with his later collecting of books, newspapers and pamphlets, the Baptist preacher and educator had recreated something of the former greatness of his library by the mid 1850's.

In both Illinois and Missouri, Peck was active in the creation of public institutions, not just for reading (as a circulating library) or in education (as a school), but in preserving the records of the past. In this manner he reflected the development in the early republic by certain farsighted individuals of philosophical, scientific, and historical societies and of the special libraries that could house research collections of all kinds. Peck participated in development of various early state historical societies, none of which survived to take root, but which all helped, through their brief example, in the eventual creation of the Illinois State Historical Society. In St. Louis, Peck urged the creation of a society to collect historical records connected with the St. Louis Mercantile Library as its proposed

site.<sup>13</sup> Peck was instrumental in the creation, on the national level, of the American Baptist Historical Society.<sup>14</sup>

Peck was very conscious of the role his own collections could play historically, if preserved. Knowing the end was near in the late winter of 1858, Peck drew up his Last Will and Testament on March 5<sup>15</sup> which bequeathed:

"...to the St. Louis Mercantile Library Association such books, bundles of pamphlets, and newspapers as have the name of that Association written or printed on or within them; and I direct all my journals and historical manuscripts, scrapbooks, files of papers, and letters of correspondence, to be deposited in the Library: Provided said Association or its Board of Directors accepts the trust and preserves the manuscripts and journals and letters of correspondence, and has the pamphlets bound, and makes the whole accessible to all persons engaged in historical researches. None are ever to be taken from the Library. And I bequeath to the said Association one hundred and fifty dollars for the purpose of providing suitable cases."

Also in the will in a related item:

"Rev. Rufus Babcock, D. D. of Paterson, New Jersey, is appointed literary executor, to be assisted by Rev. James E. Welch of Missouri, and they are to have free access to all the books, papers, etc. If necessary, they are to have temporary possession of the journals, manuscripts, letters, etc.; and, after their researches are completed, the whole to be referred and permanently deposited in the said Library."<sup>16</sup>

This gift was gratefully noted in the 7th Annual Report of the St. Louis Mercantile Library Association as a major gift in 1858 (Peck died on March 15).<sup>17</sup> As the Library acknowledged, Peck "was not only a thoughtful spectator of, but an active participant in, the vast improvements that were wrought" in forty years of citizenship in the Mississippi Valley region. The Mercantile Library clearly regarded this gift as "valuable," full of "rare treasures,"<sup>18</sup> This is bolstered by enthusiastic action and resolution of the Mercantile Board Meeting of April 6, 1858,<sup>19</sup> and the concern the gift caused for quick provision of better and secure shelving: "...your committee would call attention to the great want of shelf room in the Library... during examination there were over six hundred volumes out of the Library, while there were about two hundred volumes in the Library for which there was not room on the shelves;" and the entire Library presented to the Association by the late Rev. J. M. Peck, D.D., was lying on tables in the library room for the want of a place on the shelves...<sup>20</sup>

This situation was rectified rapidly; by the early spring following, it was reported that Mr. E. H. Grant had been hired especially for the purpose of cataloguing Peck's pamphlets and arranging other materials, including manuscripts at the rate of \$40.00 for six weeks' work,<sup>21</sup> a considerable sum for such a purpose in those days in St. Louis. This indicates the sheer size of this collection as well as the range of interests that Peck had the breadth and scope of Peck's library collections were vast.

For almost a century and a half, over one hundred volumes, some plated with special Peck bequest library bookplates (see the cover of this Guide), or with signature marks and/or extended annotations in Peck's own hand, have been placed together as the extant library of John Mason Peck at the Mercantile Library. Impressive as this collection of books is when associated to Peck, the quintessential early frontiersman, it has been a determination on the part of current library staff to unite with these books materials in the Mercantile collections - specifically pamphlets and bound manuscripts - which although certainly known to have been of Peck origin initially, were considered more valuable in their distributions across subject collections present in the Library in its earlier days. Although considered important, they were not books and, as older libraries invariably did, many of these pieces were bound up as subject pamphlet volumes.

Indeed, it is the NEH project staff's belief that part of the confusion historically which has surrounded the Peck Library's: nature and scope as it has come down to us from the Mercantile's long past, extended from, that previous decision which, though normal to the purposes of earlier generations, is no longer serviceable to the wish to learn more of the pioneer through his varied collections of books and pamphlets. The bulk of John Mason Peck's letters and other manuscripts have either been scattered through numerous historical societies and private collections over the years or lost;<sup>22</sup> however, his extant books and certain key manuscript journals exist at the Mercantile, including his own manuscript journal on Rockspring Theological Seminary, Illinois' first college. In reconstructing his library and enlarging it with Peck-associated items in the general library stacks, and through the study of uncatalogued, bound pamphlet volumes placed previously in storage, an enriched bibliographical picture of Peck's library has only recently come to light through this guide. In the process the early pioneer library has been enlarged by many hundreds of volumes of shorter printed pieces which must have been at one time considered too brief to stand on their own as "books" with the major Peck collection.

It is hoped by this Guide that what was once clearly understood to an earlier Mercantile Library staff concerning the initial processing decisions of the Peck Library has become clear

again, now that all these collections have been brought together for Examination. Hopefully the collections as they exist today will become a springboard for further study of the Peck Library. Not all materials, it is estimated, have been identified in the Mercantile stacks. The Peck collection once more, as in the collector's day, is thus a growing collection of materials relating to the settlement of the early midwest and the perennially romantic Mississippi Valley, in the era when its prospects and optimism seemed as boundlessly hopeful and confident as the expressions on the faces of those immortalized figures who peopled the river art of George Caleb Bingham or as ardently vibrant as the speeches of one of Peck's most active and exuberant Missouri contemporaries and acquaintances, Thomas Hart Benton.

Last Thursday, between nine and ten o'clock a.m., it vanished in flame and smoke! And with it is gone a large part of my valuable gatherings in files of "Newspapers, Periodicals and valuable pamphlets, of several thousand volumes - such a collection as had ever been seen in the Mississippi Valley and I doubt will ever be seen again. "I have still, however, some of the most indispensable materials in my projected labors, with all my Journals, and manuscript books and papers, and also all my letter correspondence for more than forty years safe; that being in cases at my dwelling house - and such volumes as I had occasion for daily reference are here. My sons saved a part of my library on shelves, throwing the books from the windows of the second story which (did you ever hear the like) they

dashed out, frames, sash and all, with their feet! But many of the books are damaged, covers off, and numerous sets broken. Some 300-400 volumes were burnt on the ground, before we could remove them from the building." other Peck books, newspapers, pamphlets, and manuscripts from the 1850's to the present, as listed in this Guide. The processes involved in cataloging existing collections would almost certainly have been exerted on the other items if returned, the excuse "dislocations caused by the civil War" notwithstanding, and thus render existing theories concerning library destruction of these materials somewhat suspect. The Mercantile Library did not move until the late 1880's into its present building. The most eminent library cataloguer in America, Edward Johnston, was the Head Librarian in the 1860's, followed by John Dyer, a very detail-oriented man. Had these materials been placed in the Mercantile in that period, it is very doubtful that they would have been placed in storage and subsequent oblivion when one regards the pride the Mercantile Board had in accepting the bequest at the outset, in inventorying it and in housing it with the greatest care. More research needs to be done on this matter, however; the lists of items which follow remain the only existing clues to the actual profile of Peck resources originally coming to the Mercantile in 1858. (See notes above).

## APPENDIX 1

## BAPTIST PAMPHLET COLLECTION

Historically, the Mercantile had several bound volumes of "Baptist Pamphlets" which were part of Peck's library, initially, but catalogued together under one call number. These volumes have been disbound and each pamphlet put in a separate, non-acidic enclosure. A number has been added to an alphabetical arrangement; the Mercantile had microfiled these materials in this order a generation ago. This list thus becomes an index, short title and checklist, to both the film reels and the printed pamphlets by the original volume number as indicated on original reel. Original spellings or errors have been retained. The list is roughly arranged alphabetically by the first important word of the Church, benevolent Society, or other organization's title or name concerned.

## OTHER PAMPHLETS

The bequest of Peck's Library must have been a great boon to the Mercantile in the 1850's, a time of rapid growth and collection development. The Reference Librarian of the Mercantile Library of 1940 and 1950, Elizabeth Tindell, and Elizabeth Kirchner, Head Librarian from 1965-1986, both have recently commented, on being interviewed, that various bound pamphlet volumes were almost entirely composed of Peck-owned titles. These materials were examined in the process of constructing this list of Other Pamphlets. Many of these materials fall within date ranges and possess remnants of trimmed or complete, untrimmed Peck signatures and other inscriptions, as well as previous pamphlet numbering marks in what reasonably appear to be Peck's hand. These materials, as Appendix 1 materials, await full bibliographic description and comparison studies for further verification of provenance, but have been included based on internal C1 evidence and careful hypothesis, now, as part of the original Peck bequest. Each is arranged alphabetically by the first important word of the title or creating organization and numbered consecutively. This number is carried over to the first leaf of text (verso) and the non-acidic enclosure are housed in boxed groupings. These pamphlets were bound with a few non-Peck related items (i.e. those dated after 1858 have been removed; these had been added at binding for their related content, obviously.)

As John Reynolds, early Illinois Governor and contemporary of Peck, noted in his appreciation of Peck, "Friendship's Offering," (see below) "It is a misfortune to the public that Dr. Peck did not write and publish more books than he did. For more than thirty years past I have urged him to write, and particularly to write the history of Illinois. He answered me that he had not collected sufficient materials for a complete and authentic history of the State of Illinois." (Friendship's Offering, p. 20)

Although this project was sadly never completed, Peck did write other important books on this region listed below, which are essential to the understanding of the man and his times.

These sources will prove helpful in further investigations of Peck's life and long career. This list, does not pretend to be exhaustive. A complete bibliography of Peck's own writings -books, sermons, articles -in numerous and scattered publications, was beyond the scope of the current project; nor was a complete list of Peck's works as present at the Mercantile planned, although numerous pieces are in the holdings of the Mercantile Library -including pieces found in items from the various lists outlined above.
