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
UMSL scholar receives Eminent Career Award

Mark Pope, professor and chair of the Division of counseling and Family Therapy at the University of Missouri-St. Louis, received the Eminent Career Award from the National Career Development Association. The award, the highest and most prestigious honor in the career counseling profession, was presented earlier this month during the association's Global Conference in Washington, D.C.

"I am honored to have received this award," Pope said. "This prestigious honor is one that many in my profession strive for. I have dedicated my career to helping others and to be recognized for that work is truly humbling."
