## Criminology and Criminal Justice Cited for Publication Productivity

In a recent study published in the Journal of Criminal Justice, the Department of Criminology and Criminal Justice in the College of Arts and Sciences at UM-St. Louis ranked second highest in the nation in terms of publication productivity. The study examined the publication rates using a general list of criminal justice journals, and a select list of the leading journals over the 1995-1999 period. An earlier study focusing on the 1991-1995 period had also ranked the Department in the top three.

CCJ's scholarly accomplishments are coupled with success in external funding for research. In the FY02, CCJ obtained more than \$325,000 in competitive external funding and \$3 million in earmarked funding in partnership with Georgia State University. Over the past ten years, CCJ has garnered approximately \$5 million in competitive research funding. Congratulations!

## Faculty Spotlight – David A. Ricks

David Ricks joined the UM – St. Louis faculty as a Distinguished Professor of Management and International Business in 1999. He serves as Director of International Business Programs for the College of Business Administration and was recently named a Curators' Professor.

Professor Ricks received his Doctorate in Business Administration from Indiana University in 1970. He taught at Ohio State University from 1970-1981, at the University of South Carolina from 1981-1992, and at Thunderbird, the American Graduate School of International Management, from 1992-1999.

Dr. Ricks has served as the Editor-in-Chief of the leading journal in the field of international business, the *Journal of International Business Studies*, for eight years (1984-1992) and as the founder and Editor-in-Chief of the *Journal of International Management* from 1995-1997. He also has served as Treasurer of the Academy of International Business, from 1981-1983, and Chair of the International Management Division of the Academy of Management, from 1988-1999. He is currently on the Editorial Review Boards of ten different business journals and is a consulting editor for the Blackwell Series, *Global Dimensions of Business*.

Professor Ricks has authored or co-authored 12 books and over 40 refereed journal articles. These and other publications have earned him numerous honors and awards; he has been recognized as co-author of the "Best Reference Book of the Year" (1975) by the American Library Association, "most prolific author in the *Journal of International Business Studies* for the past 25 years" (1970-1994), and Fellow of the Academy of International Business (1992-present).

When asked about his research interests, Professor Ricks explained:

"I have a wide variety of research interests and have never really been able to focus solely on one topic area at a time. I get involved in one thing for a while, then regain interest in something else. I may not return to a research area for years. Furthermore, over the years I typically have had four or five different research projects going on at any one time. Some of them are new, and some of them are continuations of my previous research efforts. I realize that this is not the research style that is generally recommended, but it seems to be the way I work best.

"Much of my research might be best grouped into three streams: foreign investment in the United States, the importance of understanding cultural differences, and international business strategy. However, I recently have become quite interested in examining 'the dark side of international business' and various 'globalization' issues. I also am quite interested in the use of technology in international business education.

“The research which has been the most fun for me has involved studying the blunders made by international businesses. This started out as just an effort to improve my teaching. I wanted to provide examples to my students of what can happen in the future if they do not pay attention to the concepts we discuss in class. However, the number of blunders in international business I uncovered grew into the hundreds, resulted in the first of four books I have written on this subject, and really captured my interest. I wanted to understand why these blunders occurred and what we can do to avoid or prevent them. I had no idea, when I started researching this topic, that it would lead to so much.”

## Expansion of Life Sciences Capacity at UM-St. Louis

### St. Louis Technopolis

UM-St. Louis has entered a consortium with Washington University, St. Louis University, BJC, and Botanical Garden to develop a core urban area referred to as St. Louis “Technopolis.” This development will provide for life and plant science facilities accommodating basic research, education, manufacturing, sales, and distribution operations. By stimulating the successful development of Technopolis, the consortium will promote, advocate, and assure the St. Louis region’s economic progress as a center of life sciences research, education, and business.

This investment will provide UM-St. Louis a unique opportunity to participate in the development of plant and life sciences enterprise in the metropolitan area. Our most recent involvement in this area has resulted in the establishment of the Center for Emerging Technologies (CET), a successful life sciences incubator operation that currently houses fourteen start-up companies. The Technopolis project will leverage our relationship with the CET, allowing UM-St. Louis to become an important participant in economic expansion and workforce development in the St. Louis region.

Deans and Vice Chancellors unanimously have supported this project.

### Collaborative Professorship in Plant Sciences

The UM-St. Louis and the Donald Danforth Plant Science Center jointly have established The E. Desmond Lee and Family Fund Endowed Professorship in Plant Sciences. A senior professor at the Department of Biology, with comparable status at the Danforth Center, will occupy the position. The professor is expected to be an outstanding scientist interested in biochemical, molecular, or structural biology research in a plant system. Research areas of interest include plant biochemistry and metabolism, root biology, and novel plant products that may lead to improved human health. The professor also will teach courses in his or her area of interest at UM-St. Louis.

Professor Elizabeth Kellogg is the Chairperson of the search committee. A national search is underway, with candidates to be interviewed in early 2003.

## New Institutes on Campus

### The Leadership Institute

UM-St. Louis has established a new Leadership Institute. The objective of this institute is to attract former CEOs and retiring politicians to join the campus as “Resident Fellows” and to provide occasional leadership seminars to students, faculty, staff, and administrators. In addition, the Fellows will serve as liaisons between the university and the community in areas ranging from fund raising to research and investment projects.

The institute will be managed by the E. Desmond Lee Endowed Professor in Developing Women Leaders and Entrepreneurs, a position yet to be filled. It will be located on the fourth floor of the Social Science Building, adjacent to the second location of the Public Policy Research Center.

## **The International Business Institute**

The College of Business Administration has established the International Business Institute. This operation has the potential to enhance the reputation and visibility of the International Business program and the College. It will serve as the infrastructure for seeking external funding for research and teaching in the field of International Business.

ELIGIBILITY: BTS invites applications from public and private non-profit entities. ## **Camille and Henry Dreyfus Foundation, Inc.** **Postdoctoral Program in Environmental Chemistry**

The program invites experts in environmental science to submit proposals for the training of Ph.D. chemists and chemical engineers in research activities related to chemistry and the environment. Each awardee may then appoint a postdoctoral scientist to spend up to two years in a program intended to stimulate the visiting scientist to carry out further research in support of environmental understanding and values. ELIGIBILITY: The program is open to all academic and other not-for-profit organizations that have well-established research efforts in environmental science or engineering. These research activities need not be located in traditional departments in the chemical sciences. Examples include but are not limited to fundamental science or engineering in topics related to the troposphere or stratosphere, aquatic or marine settings, soil or groundwater problems, environmental biochemistry, chemically benign synthesis and processing, or pollution control. FUNDING: In general, five institutions are selected annually to receive a total award of \$96,000 each. Applications are due February 28. ## **James S. McDonnell Foundation** **21<sup>st</sup> Century Research Awards**

In 2000, following a period of reflection and evaluation, the James S. McDonnell Foundation announced new grantmaking guidelines under the title, the 21st Century Science Initiative. Public funding for scientific research has increased significantly over the past 5 years and is expected to continue to increase at least through the remainder of this decade. Most scientists, particularly those working in the life sciences, have adequate funding for ongoing research. This situation creates the opportunity for private funders to use their resources to support and encourage researchers pursuing difficult, important projects, where results might be more likely to advance our current state of knowledge. Projects awarded funding through the 21st Century Science Initiative are expected to meet highly selective intellectual standards. The 21st Century Science Initiative supports research in three topics: (1) Bridging Brain, Mind, and Behavior, (2) Studying Complex Systems, and (3) Brain Cancer Research. FUNDING: 21st Century Research Awards provide adequate, flexible funding over a sufficient time period to allow investigators to pursue and develop innovative directions to their research programs. A maximum of \$450,000 total costs can be requested and the funds can be expended over a minimum of 3 years or a maximum of 6 years. Smaller amounts of money to help investigators pursue pilot projects or test the feasibility of an experimental approach are welcome. Pre-proposals are due March 14. ## **National Gallery of Art** **Visiting Senior Fellowships & Associate Appointments**

Applications will be considered for study in the history, theory, and criticism of the visual arts (painting, sculpture, architecture, landscape architecture, urbanism, prints and drawings, film, photography, decorative arts, industrial design, and other arts) of any geographical area and of any period. Applications are also

solicited from scholars in other disciplines whose work examines artifacts or has implications for the analysis and criticism of physical form. ELIGIBILITY: Visiting Senior Fellowships are intended for those who have held the Ph.D. for five years or more or who possess an equivalent record of professional accomplishment at the time of application. Visiting Senior Fellowships are awarded without regard to the age or nationality of applicants. FUNDING: There are up to twelve short-term (up to sixty days) Ailsa Mellon Bruce and Paul Mellon Visiting Senior Fellowships. Visiting Senior Fellows receive a stipend that includes round-trip travel and local expenses. Stipends for a two-month fellowship range from \$4,000 to \$7,000, depending on relocation requirements. In addition, Visiting Senior Fellows receive an allowance for photography. The Center will consider appointment of Associates who have obtained awards for full-time research from other granting institutions (other than one's home institution) and would like to be affiliated with the Center. Appointments to Associate status will be considered for periods of up to sixty days. Applications are due March 21. ## **National Science Foundation NSF/NIH Ecology of Infectious Diseases**

The Ecology of Infectious Diseases special competition supports the development of predictive models and discovery of principles for relationships between anthropogenic environmental change and transmission of infectious agents. To that end, research should focus on understanding the ecological determinants of transmission by vectors or abiotic agents, the population dynamics of reservoir species, and transmission to humans or other hosts. Proposals may focus on either terrestrial, freshwater, or marine systems and organisms. FUNDING: It is anticipated that \$8 million will be available for about 8 awards in FY 2003.
