AIR Grant Programs

The Association for Institutional Research, with support from the National Center for Education Statistics (NCES) and the National Science Foundation (NSF), invites proposals to the 2003 grant program, *Improving Institutional Research in Postsecondary Educational Institutions*. The goals of the program are to provide professional development opportunities to doctoral students, institutional researchers, educators, and administrators and to foster the use of federal databases for institutional research in postsecondary education. The grant program has four components or options for proposals: dissertation fellowships, research grants to individuals, senior fellows, and fellowships to the Data Policy Institute. Department of Energy

Continuation of Solicitation for the Office of Science Financial Assistance Program

The Office of Science (OS) of the Department of Energy (DOE) announces its continuing interest in receiving grant applications for support of work in the following program areas: Basic Energy Sciences, High Energy Physics, Nuclear Physics, Advanced Scientific Computing, Fusion Energy Sciences, Biological and Environmental Research, and Energy Research Analyses. On September 3, 1992, DOE published in the Federal Register the Office of Energy Research Financial Assistance Program (now called the Office of Science Financial Assistance Program), 10 CFR part 605, Final Rule, which contained a solicitation for this program. Information about submission of applications, eligibility, limitations, evaluation and selection processes and other policies and procedures are specified in 10 CFR part 605.

Network on the Scientific Workforce Multi-Disciplinary Dissertation Fellowships

The Network on the Scientific Workforce has received resources from the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation to support dissertation fellowships. The purpose of the fellowships is to broadly facilitate the research goals of the NBER-Sloan Network on the Scientific Workforce, while at the same time providing valuable assistance to aspiring scholars. The Network plans to make several awards, ranging from half-year fellowships to up to two years of support (\$7,000 minimum to a maximum of \$30,000). The fellowships will not cover tuition, and are for Ph.D. candidates who have begun the dissertation and/or are nearing completion.

The Network on the Scientific Workforce is currently pursuing a wide range of projects which examine the supply and demand for the scientific workforce. Dissertation projects on the contemporary scientific workforce can come from a variety of social science approaches and disciplines: economics, sociology, political science, history, history of science, psychology, and others. The research should contribute to a better understanding of the ongoing evolution of the scientific workforce. Applications are due December 1. Grant Opportunities American Association for the Advancement of Science

The fellowships are designed to provide a unique, internationally-oriented public policy learning experience; to demonstrate the value of science and technology in addressing important societal and foreign policy concerns; and to make practical contributions to the more effective use of scientific and technical knowledge in the foreign affairs and international development programs of the U.S. government. Fellows spend one year, beginning in September 2003, working either in one of several bureaus

of the U.S. Agency for International Development (USAID), the U.S. Department of State (State) or the National Institutes of Health's Fogarty International Center (FIC). Individuals will be selected whose scientific and technical backgrounds can contribute to international affairs, foreign policy or international development. The program includes an orientation on international affairs and executive branch and congressional operations, and a year-long seminar program on issues involving science, technology and public policy. **ELIGIBILITY:** All applicants must have a PhD or an equivalent doctoral-level degree by the application deadline (January 10, 2003). Individuals with a master's degree in engineering and at least three years of post-degree professional experience may apply. All applicants must be U.S. citizens. **FUNDING:** In cooperation with the four participating agencies, AAAS will select 15 or more Diplomacy Fellows for 2003-04. The fellowships are one-year appointments, potentially renewable for a second year. The aim of the fellowship is to foster collaboration between NCHS staff and visiting scholars on a wide range of topics of mutual concern. Visiting scholars may conduct new and innovative analyses and participate in developmental and health policy activities related to the design and content of future NCHS surveys. **ELIGIBILITY:** Applicants must demonstrate training and/or experience in health services research, reflecting academic training in disciplines such as: public health; public administration; health care administration; sociology; health economics; health statistics; anthropology; behavioral sciences; as well as the health professions (e.g., medicine, nursing, dentistry, pharmacology). Applicants may be at any stage in their career from doctoral students (who must have completed course work and be at the dissertation phase of their program) to senior investigators. **FUNDING:** Salaries provided are commensurate with qualifications and experience. Doctoral student fellows may qualify for a salary based on a GS-9/11/12 civil service equivalent of \$38,406 to \$72,400. Learning Opportunities Grants 2003

Continuing its commitment to building the effectiveness of museums as they meet their institutional missions, the Institute of Museum and Library Services is refocusing its former General Operating Support grants to meet the changing needs of the 21st century. For FY 2003, as the evaluation and study of GOS continues, IMLS will offer a one-time funding opportunity for museums to address one or more strategic goals: (a) building public access; (b) expanding educational services; (c) reaching families and children, and (d) using technology more effectively in support of these goals. The Learning Opportunities funding program will encourage museums to invest in their abilities to use their collections, exhibits, and services to strengthen learning in the schools, in the home and in partnership with other community organizations. The goal of Learning Opportunities funding is to provide museums of across the country with a unique opportunity to advance their capacity to serve a wider and more diverse public through education, partnership and/or technology. Applicants will define how funding relates to their institution's strategic agendas in the critical area of public service. **FUNDING:** IMLS seeks to distribute funding for Learning Opportunities grants across all types and sizes of museums, as well as among all funding categories. Applicants may apply in three funding categories: \$5,000 - \$24,999; \$25,000 - \$74,999 or \$75,000 - \$150,000. Ford Foundation Postdoctoral Fellowships for Minorities

To foster diversity on the nation's college and university faculties and campuses, the Postdoctoral Fellowships for Minorities program identifies outstanding researchers and scholars who are members of minority groups whose

underrepresentation in the professoriate and in formal programs of postdoctoral study and research in the United States has been long-standing and remains severe as a result of past discrimination. The program enables fellows to engage in a year of postdoctoral research and scholarship in an environment free from the interference of their normal professional duties. In sponsoring this fellowship program, the Ford Foundation wishes to help recent doctoral recipients achieve greater recognition and develop the professional associations that will make them more effective and productive in academic employment. **ELIGIBILITY:** Fellowships will be offered only to individuals who are citizens or nationals of the United States and who are members of the following groups: Alaska Natives (Eskimo or Aleut); Black/African Americans; Mexican Americans/Chicanas/Chicanos; Native American Indians; Native Pacific Islanders (Micronesian/Polynesian); Puerto Ricans. Grants are made to nonprofit institutions in the United States and other countries in response to proposals. Fundamental research is currently supported in chemistry, the earth sciences, chemical engineering, and in related fields such as polymers and materials science. The ACS Petroleum Research Fund announces its newest grant program Type AEF for two-year Alternative Energy Postdoctoral Fellowships with an annual value (stipend plus benefits) of \$50,000 for a total award of \$100,000. The goal of the AEF program is to stimulate young scientists to direct their careers toward fundamental studies in the alternative energy field. Applicants are responsible for choosing the host institution and mentor for the research. Eligibility is limited to United States citizens and permanent residents. **Applications are due December 2. Robert Wood Johnson Foundation Health Policy Fellowships

The Robert Wood Johnson Health Policy Fellowships Program provides an outstanding opportunity for exceptional midcareer health professionals and behavioral and social scientists with an interest in health to take part in and better understand the health policy processes at the federal level. Fellows actively contribute to the formulation of national health policies and accelerate their careers as leaders in health policy. Up to eight Fellows will be selected for the program. Its first phase and core element is a 12- to 16-month experience in Washington, D.C., that starts with an orientation period, from September to December 2003, and continues with a full-time work assignment in either the legislative or the executive branch of the federal government. Smithsonian Institution Senior, Postdoctoral, and Predoctoral Fellowships

Fellowships at the Smithsonian Institution provide students and scholars with opportunities to pursue independent research projects in association with members of the Smithsonian professional research staff. **PREDOCTORAL FELLOWSHIPS** - These

fellowships allow students to conduct research for periods of three to twelve months. Applicants must have completed coursework and preliminary examinations for the doctoral degree, and must be engaged in dissertation research. In addition, candidates must have the approval of their universities to conduct their doctoral research at the Smithsonian. POSTDOCTORAL FELLOWSHIPS of three to twelve months are available for scholars who have held the doctoral degree or equivalent for fewer than seven years as of the application deadline. SENIOR FELLOWSHIPS of three to twelve months are available for scholars who have held the doctoral degree or equivalent for more than seven years as of the application deadline. Applications for senior fellowships may be made up to two years in advance. Stipends for this fellowship are the same as for the postdoctoral program, but the Smithsonian's stipend may be matched by other sources of funding such as a sabbatical salary. FUNDING: Stipends for Postdoctoral and Senior Fellowships are \$30,000 per year. Earth and Planetary Sciences Senior and Postdoctoral Fellowship stipends are \$40,000 per year.
