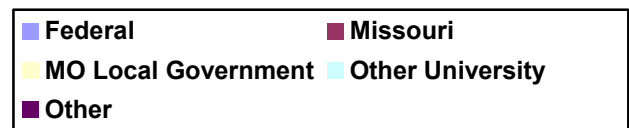
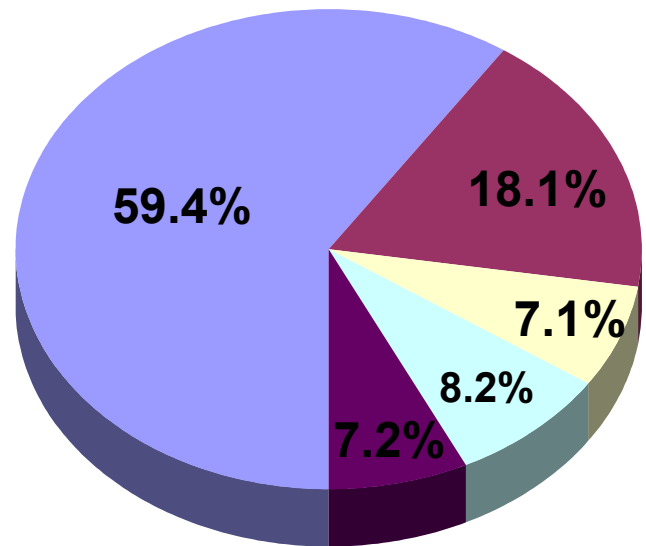

Faculty Spotlight

Janet L. Lauritsen, Professor of Criminology and Criminal Justice, joined the faculty of UM-St. Louis in 1990 after receiving her Ph.D. and completing post-doctoral research in sociology at the University of Illinois at Urbana-Champaign. Her research specialties include the causes and consequences of victimization, the role of race and ethnicity in crime and victimization, and quantitative research methods. With Robert J. Sampson, she has co-authored state-of-the-art summary reviews on these topics that have been published by the National Research Council, the University of Chicago Press, and Oxford University Press. Her research has appeared in numerous journals including *Criminology*, *Journal of Quantitative Criminology*, *Social Forces*, *Criminology & Public Policy*, *Journal of Research in Crime and Delinquency*, and *Violence and Victims*.

Dr. Lauritsen's research focuses on disentangling the individual, family, and community correlates of violent victimization. In the past, the lack of sufficient data made this task impossible. However, in 1997 she was one of a handful of researchers granted access to data that allowed her to combine community information available in census records with individual and family data available in the National Crime Victimization Survey (the only national data source on crime not derived from police records). This research involved challenges not normally encountered in statistical analyses, most notably that the data be physically restricted to a Census Research Data Center at Carnegie Mellon University and that all results be reviewed by the Census Bureau to ensure the confidentiality of subjects. Dr. Lauritsen's research led to new insights about the relative contribution of community and individual factors to violent victimization risk. Support for this research was provided by the National Consortium on Violence Research (an NSF funded research center), the American Statistical Association, and the National Center for Juvenile Justice.

More recently, Dr. Lauritsen has been documenting the history of methodological decision-making underlying the development of the National Crime Victimization Survey. This research is made possible by special access to 30 years of internal correspondence between the Bureau of Justice Statistics and the Census Bureau, and by funding from the Bureau of Justice Statistics.

Dr. Lauritsen has served as a Visiting Research Fellow at the Bureau of Justice Statistics, a member and the in-coming Chair of the American Statistical Association's Committee on Law and Justice Statistics, and a member of the National Research Council's Committee to Review Police Policy and Practice. In addition, she currently serves on the Editorial Boards of the *Journal of Quantitative Criminology* and *Criminology*.

Dr. Lauritsen has taught criminological theory, victimology, and statistics to undergraduate and graduate students. In 2002, she received the Governor's Award for Teaching Excellence. This award honors outstanding faculty from post-secondary schools, colleges, and universities in Missouri. Each year, one recipient from each institution is recognized for their effective teaching and advising, success in fostering student achievement, and commitment to high standards of excellence.

Violations to cost University of South Florida millions

Granting agencies have begun to exert closer scrutiny of funded projects. In an effort to preempt similar problems, we are reprinting an article dealing with inappropriate charges to grant accounts.

Mistakes including inappropriate spending and poor record keeping will force the school to repay about \$4-million.

TAMPA - The University of South Florida must return \$4-million to the federal government for inappropriately spending research grants and failing to properly record purchases. The university also owes the state \$1.44-million after federal auditors found violations in almost all of USF's colleges, including the College of Public Health. Federal auditors estimate USF might have wasted nearly \$8-million the past four years. They accuse USF of a slew of mistakes, including charging clerical costs to grants without justification, purchasing equipment after a project already ended and paying for employees to travel who did not report working on a grant. But the amount USF will actually owe is likely to amount to \$4.1-million. The school and federal investigators are negotiating a settlement, which could allow the university to take 10 years to pay. It's unclear where the university will find the money, but it will come from research accounts. The settlement will end a four-year investigation that began with a routine audit and mushroomed into the largest and most comprehensive inquiry of its kind in the school's 46-year history. The federal government routinely conducts audits of nonprofit groups that receive federal grants, including universities that raise hundreds of millions of dollars in grants each year. Florida International University is being investigated now, and auditors estimate the Miami school owes the federal government at least \$4.5-million. USF officials on Wednesday downplayed the violations, disputing some of the findings and describing others as old mistakes. They said they spent the money properly but failed to properly document the spending. "Some mistakes we made, some we didn't," said Carl Carlucci, USF executive vice president and chief financial officer. "It's just about the bookkeeping." Ian Phillips, vice president for research, said the disputed money is minor compared to the amount the school receives each year. USF has continued to receive other federal grants, Phillips said. USF has become a research powerhouse in Florida, collecting a record \$254-million in grants last year, second only to the University of Florida. Nearly \$123-million came from the federal government; the rest was from state and local governments and private groups. Among the largest: \$6-million for antibioterrorism research, \$2.9-million for public health and disaster preparedness and more than \$6-million to explore ways to use underwater vehicles for homeland defense. "The main thing is that we did the work," said Phillips, who was hired in February. "There is no question of the scientific merit of the work." Phillips said the federal government has been notified about major changes that took effect July 1 allowing a more centralized record-keeping network. He said he also will educate the faculty about new procedures and what the audit showed went wrong. USF president Judy Genshaft, who is in San Diego this week to speak to economic development experts, could not be reached Wednesday. The Office of the Inspector General at the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services conducts routine audits of schools, hospitals and any other nonprofit groups that receive federal grants. Officials there said they could not comment on pending cases. The case is not expected to be completed for several months. The investigation stemmed from an audit of the Lawton and Rhea Chiles Center for Healthy Mothers and Babies, which opened as part of the USF College of Public Health in 1998. It began in December 1999, was expanded to other colleges in 2001 and concluded earlier this year. The Chiles Center audit suggested that USF also failed to pay the state Agency on Health Care and Administration money to administer a Medicaid contract. USF is negotiating a \$1.44-million settlement with the state. The entire audit of 1998-99 records - a sample of documents from every college - revealed almost \$2-million in errors. The worst offenders include the colleges of Education, Public Health, and Marine Sciences, totaling almost \$1.5-million. USF appealed that amount, claiming the mistakes were \$700,000. "We don't accept the \$1.9-million worth of mistakes," Phillips said. "We're not hiding anything. This is past history." At FIU, federal auditors last year began investigating a seven-year, \$32-million grant to study nuclear waste decontamination. Provost Mark Rosenberg said the

school disputes almost all of the cited violations and the \$4.5-million the federal government recommends the school returns.

This pilot program of Undergraduate Research Centers (URCs) seeks new models and partnerships with the potential (1) to expand the reach of undergraduate research to include first- and second-year college students; and (2) to enhance the research capacity, infrastructure, and culture of participating institutions, thereby strengthening the nation's research enterprise. For this pilot program, research should be in the chemical

sciences or in interdisciplinary areas supported by the chemical sciences. Projects should provide exposure to research of contemporary scientific interest that is addressed with modern research tools and methods. This solicitation supports both planning grants that can be used to develop models, partnerships, and pilot projects; and awards in support of the full scope of URC activity.

The National Science Foundation (NSF) seeks to promote improvement in the education of those who study science, technology, engineering, or mathematics (STEM). The NSF Director's Award for Distinguished Teaching Scholars (DTS) recognizes and rewards individuals who have contributed significantly to the scholarship of their discipline and to the education of students in STEM, and exemplify the ability to engage productively in both research and education. DTS is part of NSF's efforts to foster an academic culture that values a scholarly approach to both research and education. The Director's Award is the highest honor bestowed by the NSF for excellence in both teaching and research in STEM fields, or in educational research related to these disciplines. The awards will be conferred at a special ceremony recognizing the awardees.

International Materials Institutes (IMI) NSF 03-593

The National Science Foundation supports International Materials Institutes (IMIs) in order to enhance international collaboration between U.S. researchers and educators and their counterparts worldwide. These Institutes advance fundamental materials research by coordinating international research and education projects involving condensed matter and materials physics; solid state and materials chemistry; and the design, synthesis, characterization, and processing of materials to meet global and regional needs. The Institutes must be university-based and provide a research environment that will attract leading scientists and engineers. The Institutes' long-term goal is the creation of a worldwide network in materials research and the development of a new generation of scientists and engineers with enhanced international leadership capabilities. A critically important aspect of an IMI is its potential impact on advancing materials research on an international scale and developing an internationally competitive generation of materials researchers, and this distinguishes an IMI from other materials research centers that NSF supports. Representative activities of an IMI may include, for example: identifying areas of important and innovative research for joint collaborative programs; organizing and coordinating international exchange programs; establishing mechanisms for long-term international collaborations among academia, industrial and government agencies and laboratories; organizing international workshops on materials research and education, and coordinating international research experiences for students and postdoctoral scholars; developing internet-based resources with video capabilities for international conferencing and learning; developing and supporting a materials research network that will provide access to research and education resources, such as searchable databases, publications, facilities, instruments, and experts; enhancing public awareness of economic and societal contributions by materials researchers; and partnering with states, private foundations, industry, national laboratories, international organizations, other universities, centers, and national facilities to accomplish the stated goals of the IMI.

CCLI: Assessment of Student Achievement in Undergraduate Education NSF 03-584

The Course, Curriculum, and Laboratory Improvement (CCLI) program seeks to improve the quality of Science, Technology, Engineering, and Mathematics (STEM) education for all students, based on research concerning needs and opportunities in undergraduate education and effective ways to address them. It targets activities affecting learning environments, course content, curricula, and educational practices, with the aim of contributing to the relevant research base that will support efforts to enhance STEM education. The program has four tracks. Assessment of Student Achievement in Undergraduate Education (CCLI - ASA), which began as a separate program in March 2001, is now one of these four tracks. With this addition, CCLI is more effectively positioned as a self-contained program to support the cycle of research and innovation that leads to improvement in undergraduate education. The other three tracks are Educational Materials Development (EMD), National Dissemination (ND), and Adaptation and Implementation (A&I). These other tracks and the relationships among these four tracks is described in greater detail in the Introduction, under the heading "Rationale for CCLI Program." The program solicitation for CCLI - EMD/ND is published as NSF 03-558 and is available at: <http://www.nsf.gov/pubsys/ods/getpub.cfm?nsf03558>. The program solicitation for CCLI - A&I is anticipated in August 2003. A November or December 2003 proposal deadline is anticipated. These three program solicitations have different proposal deadlines in order to spread the reviewing and processing of proposals more evenly throughout the year. CCLI - ASA (or ASA) supports research on assessment, and the development and dissemination of assessment practices, materials (tools), and measures to guide efforts that improve the effectiveness of courses, curricula, programs of study, and academic institutions in promoting student achievement, particularly in science, technology, engineering, and mathematics. ASA also promotes the full integration of assessment with these educational efforts. ASA projects may be integrated with research on learning, particularly research focused in the STEM disciplines. It supports projects in three areas:

1. New Development: developing and validating new assessment materials (tools) and practices for use in single or multiple undergraduate disciplines.
2. Adaptation: adapting assessment materials and practices that have proven effective for one setting or audience for use in a new setting or with a different audience.
3. Dissemination: efforts to spread the use of effective assessment practices through workshops or Web-based materials that have been validated and are thoroughly documented with detailed instructions.

AMERICAN ACADEMY IN ROME ROME PRIZE FELLOWSHIPS

Established in 1894 and chartered by an Act of Congress in 1905, the American Academy in Rome is a center that sustains independent artistic pursuits and humanistic studies. It is situated on the Janiculum, Rome's highest hill. Each year, through a national competition, the Rome Prize is awarded to 15 emerging artists (working in Architecture, Landscape Architecture, Design, Historic Preservation and Conservation, Literature, Musical Composition, or Visual Arts) and 15 scholars (working in Ancient, Medieval, Renaissance and early Modern, or Modern Italian Studies). Rome Prize fellowships are designed for emerging artists and for scholars in the early or middle stages of their careers. In the case of scholars, preference will be given to applicants for whom research time in Italy, and especially in the city of Rome, is essential, and who have not had extensive prior experience there. The Academy also offers a variety of opportunities for advanced scholars and artists. **ELIGIBILITY:** Applicants for all Rome Prize fellowships, except those applying for the NEH post-doctoral fellowship, must be United States citizens at the time of application. U.S. citizens and those foreign nationals who have lived in the U.S. for the three years immediately preceding the application deadline may apply for the NEH post-doctoral fellowships. Graduate students in the humanities may apply only for pre-doctoral fellowships. **FUNDING:** Each Rome Prize winner is provided with a stipend, meals, a bedroom with private bath, and a study or studio. Those with children under 18 live in partially subsidized apartments nearby. Winners of six-month and 11-month fellowships receive stipends of \$10,500 and \$21,000, respectively. Pre-doctoral awards, which include 11-month and two-year fellowships, carry an annual stipend of \$15,750.

GLADYS KRIEBLE DELMAS FOUNDATION GRANTS FOR INDEPENDENT RESEARCH ON VENETIAN HISTORY AND CULTURE

The Gladys Kriebel Delmas Foundation announces its 2004-2005 program of grants (predoctoral and postdoctoral) for travel to and residence in Venice and the Veneto. Grants will be awarded for historical research specifically on Venice and the former Venetian empire, and for study of contemporary Venetian society and culture. Disciplines of the humanities and social sciences are eligible areas of study, including (but not limited to) archaeology, architecture, art, bibliography, economics, history, history of science, law, literature, music, political science, religion, and theater. **ELIGIBILITY:** Applicants must (i) be citizens or permanent residents of the United States, (ii) have experience in advanced research at the graduate level or equivalent, and (iii) if graduate students, have fulfilled all doctoral requirements except completion of the dissertation (but including acceptance of dissertation proposal) by December 15, 2003. **FUNDING:** Applications will be entertained for grants up to a maximum of \$16,500 for a full academic year. Grants for the maximum amount are rarely awarded, and successful applicants are frequently awarded less than the amount requested.

FY 2004 EDUCATIONAL PARTNERSHIPS PROGRAM - ECA/A/S/U-04-03

To encourage mutual understanding, educational reform, economic development, and civil society in the targeted countries, the Educational Partnerships Program enables U.S. colleges and universities and foreign counterpart institutions to pursue objectives cooperatively through exchange visits of faculty, administrators, highly advanced foreign students, and advanced U.S. graduate students who can demonstrate the ability to work independently. The Educational Partnerships Program is not designed to support study abroad activities for undergraduate students or less advanced graduate students. U.S. and foreign colleges and universities that have hosted, enrolled, or employed State Department sponsored grantees or alumni as professors, students, or administrators are especially encouraged to develop proposals that build on the achievements of these individual grantees and extend their impact. The eligibility of foreign countries and locations is limited and varies from year to year (see program announcement). Proposals to increase the understanding of the United States in countries and societies with significant Muslim populations are especially encouraged, as are proposals to increase the understanding of these countries and societies in the United States. FUNDING: The maximum award in the FY 2004 competition will be \$150,000 for a three-year period (except where noted in the program announcement).

JAMES MCKEEN CATTELL FUND SUPPLEMENTAL SABBATICAL AWARDS FOR PSYCHOLOGISTS

For over half a century, the James McKeen Cattell Fund has provided support for the science and the application of psychology. The Fund offers a program of supplementary sabbatical awards ("James McKeen Cattell Fund Fellowships"). These awards supplement the regular sabbatical allowance provided by the recipients' home institutions, to allow an extension of leave-time from one to two semesters. **ELIGIBILITY:** James McKeen Cattell Fund awards are available to psychologists who are faculty members at colleges and universities in the United States and Canada, and are eligible, according to the regulations of their own institutions, for a sabbatical leave or its equivalent. Eligible candidates must be either tenured faculty members or nontenured associate professors in a tenure-track position. Ordinarily, awards are made to persons who have been continuously employed in an academic teaching or administrative position for the previous five years. BERLIN PROGRAM FOR ADVANCED GERMAN AND EUROPEAN STUDIES

This program is administered by the Council and based at the Freie University, t Berlin which also funds the program. United States administrative costs and selected Postdoctoral fellows are funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities. The Program's purpose is to encourage the comparative and interdisciplinary study of the economic, political and social aspects of modern and contemporary German and European affairs. The Program supports anthropologists, economists, political scientists, sociologists and all scholars in germane social science and cultural studies fields, including historians working on the period since the mid-19th century. ELIGIBILITY: Citizens and permanent residents of the United States and Canada are eligible to apply. At the dissertation level, applicants must have completed all requirements (except the dissertation) for the PhD at the time the fellowship begins.
