



## Southwestern Illinois College/ University of Missouri- St. Louis General Education Transfer Guide



Students that are not completing an AA/AS degree from SWIC that includes the Illinois Articulation Initiative approved general education core should choose courses from this guide to ensure transferability of coursework to meet the UMSL General Education Requirements.

**Art Education, Business, Education, Engineering, Music Education, Nursing, and Social Work majors should consult with an UMSL Transfer Coordinator before selecting from this guide.**

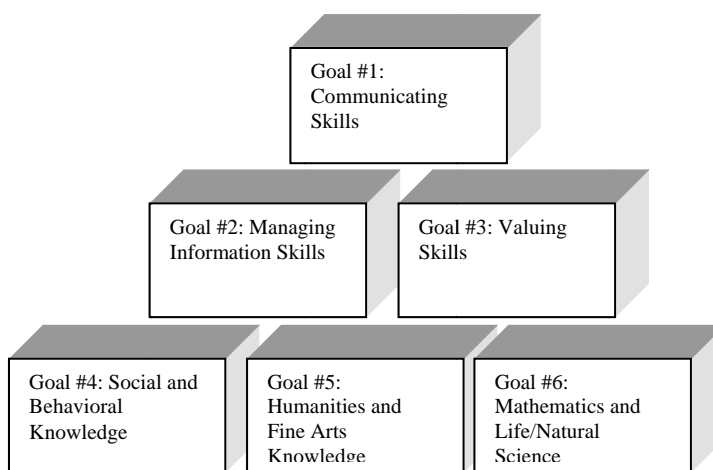
The new University of Missouri- St. Louis general education program complies fully with the Missouri Coordinating Board of Higher Education Guidelines on Transfer Articulation (June 2000). All students, native and transfer, must complete a 42-hour block of courses in six areas: Communicating Skills, Managing Information Skills, Valuing Skills, Social and Behavioral Knowledge, Humanities and Fine Arts Knowledge, and Mathematics and Life/Natural Sciences.

### INSTRUCTIONS FOR USING THIS GUIDE

Many courses satisfy more than one goal. Courses which meet more than one goal appear in the shaded fields. Each course listed in the shaded fields may be counted to fulfill all of the goals for which the course is listed.

The number following each course in parentheses is the number of hours earned at SWIC by completion of that course. Once a student has met the required number of hours under each goal, they may take any of the courses listed to achieve the 42-hour block.

Example: **SOCI 131 Introduction to Sociology (3)** satisfies 3 hours of both Goal #3: Valuing Skills and Goal #: Social and Behavioral Knowledge.
