SCMA/INTL BUS 5381: Course Overview: (CoBA Bulletin 2023-2024)

Prerequisite: SCMA 5310 Supply Chain Strategies

This course covers global supply chain management strategy, planning and operations. Topics include issues in global trade, global network design and facility location strategies, international logistics, import-export operations, and global supply chain risk management.

Learning Objectives

At the end of this course, students will be able to (in their own words):

- describe the state of global trade and its impact on global supply chain management.
- describe typical global supply chain strategies (foreign market entry, facility location, offshoring).



- explain the challenges, opportunities, and risks along the global supply chain.
- identify resources and apply tools available to manage a global supply chain.

Our Canvas Course Site:

Class Format:

This class will be delivered in an **Online Format**. You can find everything for our course on our **Canvas Course Site: SCMA 5381 Global Supply Chain Management.** Simply move through - page by page. There is no need to jump around looking for files or assignments.

We will follow **15 weekly Modules**, each addressing one topic in Global Supply Chain Management. We will use a traditional textbook, supplemented with readings and videos from the business press and other sources as appropriate. Our weekly work will include readings in the Textbook and other, relevant materials that will form the basis of our discussions and assignments.

All **Assignments and Quizzes** will be submitted on line through our Canvas Course Site. Please let me know if you have questions about how to submit Assignments, take the Quizzes, or access the materials online. I will be available to meet with you on Zoom. Just let me know when you would like to visit and I will set it up.

Time Requirements for Our Course:

Our course is a 3-credit hour, graduate-level course and requires 3 hours of your time each week in addition to the time it takes you to read the required materials, watch the videos, and complete the assignments. That means that you need to **plan to spend a minimum of 6** hours every week on activities related to this course.

As a student in an Online course, you are expected to have reliable internet access almost every day. Please see the Technology Requirements in our *Resources to help you succeed* Module.

How the Course is Structured:

- This course is organized into Fifteen, One-Week Modules
- Each Module explores a key topic within global supply chain management and related business issues.
- Modules run from **Mondays at 12:00 am through Sundays at 11:59 pm** (There is no need to run ahead; please focus on the material in the current Module).
- Each Module opens on Monday at 12 am. The Modules remain open so you can return to previous topics and review.
- When you click on a Module (on our Course Site's Home Page) you will see the

 - Learning Outcomes what you should be able to do after completing the Module
 - Agenda "to do this week ..." what you need to complete for that Module over that week.

The **Agenda** in each weekly Module may ask you to:

- 1. Complete Readings in the **Textbook (optional)**;
- 2. View a **PowerPoint presentation** covering the main topic for that week;
- 3. View a **Lecture Video** (Voice Thread) for that topic;
- 4. View other **videos** related to that Module's topic;
- 5. Complete **Assignments** including outside readings or review of a website, participate in a Discussion Board or submit a written assignment(s) (for example, an essay, short answer questions or exercise) or a Quiz.

All Assignments and Quizzes are submitted through our Canvas course site and are **DUE by 11:59 pm on the Sunday indicated**. Assignments and Quizzes are posted in the appropriate



Module - *you do not have to jump around the Course Site - just follow the Module, page by page.

At the end of each Module be sure to go over the page: **At the end of Module** To be sure you have completed all activities and requirements for that Module. The last page of each Module reminds you what you should understand and be able to explain – in your own words - after completing that Module.

Description of Graded Assignments:

Our **Four Assignments** focus on practical application of the material covered. The assignments may be short answer or essay questions; participating in a class discussion on a relevant, current event; preparing a short case report; or, completing further investigation and making a presentation on a particular aspect of the global supply chain. All Assignments are submitted online, through our Canvas Course Site.

Our **Six Quizzes** are made up of 25 multiple choice/true-false questions and you have 50 minutes to complete them. Material included in the Quizzes is drawn from the specific Modules indicated, including readings, videos, web site reviews, and discussion posts. They are not cumulative. The Quizzes are submitted on-line, through our Canvas Course Site. They are "Open Book".

In our **Team Projects** you place yourself in the shoes of a Global Supply Chain Officer. You will prepare a written report and corresponding PowerPoint Presentation (Executive Summary)



for your management recommending where your firm should establish a foreign manufacturing operation. Details are posted separately below.



How to succeed in this course:

My goal is for each of you to succeed in this course by mastering the basic concepts of global supply chain management and further developing good management, decision-making skills. Along the way, I want you to meet a lot of great, new people, discover new areas of interest and have fun!

Here are some tips to help you succeed:

- Each Module covers one concept or activity in global supply chain management and associated business functions. It's best to review the Module at the beginning of the week, paying particular attention to the stated Learning Outcomes presented at the beginning of each Module.
- After completing a Module, you should be able to explain or describe the Learning Outcomes IN YOUR OWN WORDS.
- As you go through the week, please complete the assigned readings, review the Power Point Slides, videos and other material assigned.
- For our written Assignments I suggest you read or view the material early in the week and think about the questions or what you need to prepare. Then, when you sit down to write your essay or post you clearly know what you want to communicate.
- It's useful to use the **Learning Outcomes** to check your understanding of the topic, stay on schedule and be prepared for our Assignments and Quizzes.

Questions:

Chances are if you have a question someone else in the class has that same question. I have posted a *Course Café!* in our *START HERE!* Module for you to post general questions about the course or the material. I hope you use this to share tips or information among yourselves. I will respond to the discussion board regularly. I encourage students to read and respond to postings from their classmates as well. You are always welcome to email me with any questions or if you would like to personally discuss something.

Online Discussion Guidelines:

- Participation in the course should maintain a positive work and learning environment, as outlined in the UM Collected Rules & Regulations, 330.080.
- Postings should be evenly distributed during the discussion week.
- Postings should be a minimum of three sentences, or one short paragraph, and a maximum of two paragraphs.
- Responses should be well written with proper punctuation, spelling and grammar.
- Avoid short one-word postings, for instance, "I agree," unless accompanied by supporting statements from the readings or prior knowledge (work and life experience).
- Stay focused on the topic.



- Ask questions; challenge other postings that lack supporting evidence or present incorrect information.
- Encourage further discussion by building on current threads.
- Check your postings for responses from others and respond in kind.
- Use proper "Netiquette".

Online Class Netiquette/Behavior:

- Be self-reflective before you post an emotional response and reread what you have written to be sure it is positive. Think of your comments as printed in the newspaper. Your online comments will be seen, heard and remembered by others in the class.
- Use effective communication.
- Avoid the use of all caps or multiple punctuation elements (!!!, ??? etc.).
- Be polite, understate rather than overstate your point, and use positive language.
- o If you are using acronyms, jargon or uncommon terms, be sure to explain them so everyone can understand and participate in the discussion.
- Ask for clarification to a point if you feel emotional from a classmate's post. It
 is likely that you misunderstood his/her point. This strategy will also help you
 step away from the intensity of the moment to allow for more reflection.
- **Sign your name.** It is easier to build a classroom community when you know to whom you are responding.
- **Foster community.** Share your great ideas and contribute to ongoing discussions. Consider each comment you make as one that is adding to, or detracting from, a positive learning environment for you and your classmates.
 - **Be constructive.** You can challenge ideas and the course content, but avoid becoming negative online. When you disagree politely, you stimulate and encourage great discussion. You also maintain positive relationships with others with whom you may disagree on a certain point.
 - Keep the conversation on topic by responding to questions, adding thoughtful comments about the topics at hand. Online dialogue is like conversation. If there is a certain dialogue going on, please add to it, but if you have something new to say, please post it in another thread.
 - Define your terms. When using acronyms or terms that are particular to your field (or new to our course), please define them for others.



Attendance Policies:

- If you are unable to participate in the scheduled class, activity or discussions, please let me know as soon as possible so that we can make alternative arrangements and so that you don't fall behind in your work.
- Present in class for an online course is determined by participation in an "academically related activity," i.e. submission of an assignment, assessment or discussion forum posting. The last day of attendance is the last day a student is academically participating in the course online as defined here.
