## **Elective Courses (12 hours, Thesis):**

A student selecting the thesis option must complete the core course and seminar course requirements. Six of the remaining 12 credit hours may be granted for thesis research. The six thesis research hours are normally taken in three-hour increments over the two successive semesters, immediately preceding graduation, and after course requirements are completed.
