The total number of hours required for the major is 37. Students may elect to take up to, but not to exceed, 15 additional hours in anthropology courses of their choice.

 Graduates will develop social science writing skills, including writing of a
 research proposal for a grant agency and a substantial research report. Graduates
 will develop oral presentation skills, including presenting a formal research
 report.
- Information Management/Quantitative Skills
 Graduates will master research methods in one of the subfields of anthropology
 (cultural anthropology, biological anthropology, archaeology). Graduates will
 learn to design and conduct an original research project, working in close
 cooperation with faculty.
- Valuing/Ethics/Integrity
 Graduates will be able to discuss and articulate the professional ethics and codes of conduct of the discipline.

- Critical Thinking Skills
 Graduates will develop the ability to apply anthropological concepts in
 performing critical analysis of broad historical trends and complex social
 issues. Graduates will be able to value cultural diversity, thus preparing them to
 function in multicultural or international settings.
- Application/Internship Skills
 Graduates will gain hands-on experience in the application of anthropological
 concepts to real life and will be able to apply anthropological theory to real-life
 experience.

Justification for request:

The additional courses facilitate the graduation of the current anthropology majors as we seek to provide the necessary methods courses to enable them to graduate in a timely manner. Owing to Covid-19 restrictions, the attrition of anthropology faculty, and the retirement of the human skeletal remains collection in preparation for the transition to the History department, most of the listed anthropology methods courses were not taught in the past 18 months and will not be taught going forward.
