Rationale

The MSN to DNP Curriculum was recently updated to reflect needed changes to the DNP Curriculum based on student needs. NURSE 7209 Advanced Nursing Roles and the Role of the DNP was removed from the curriculum (this course content was merged with other courses throughout the curriculum). NURSE 7251 Health Economics course content is being merged with NURSE 7443 Healthcare Policy and Economics. The general "Nursing Elective" statement was added and specific Nursing Electives were taken out of the curriculum, due to electives always changing. NURSE 7215 Evidence-Based Practice for the DNP was added to the curriculum to bring in needed course content to further assist students with their DNP projects and conducting literature reviews/research.
