General Education Requirements

Majors must satisfy the university and college general education requirements. Any foreign language may be used to meet the language requirement for the B.A. degree.

All required courses for the major must be completed with a grade of C- or better. Courses counting toward the major requirements may not be taken on a satisfactory/unsatisfactory basis.

The minimum number of Sociology hours required for the B.S. degree is 36 33.

Rationale

Under our current program structure, students are forced to choose a concentration in order to declare sociology as a major. This requirement to choose a discipline-path immediately has a detrimental effect on student enrollment and retention. Students tell us it is too early to choose, and and the program is too complicated. They also tell us that the 1000 level SOC courses are repetitive. This proposal streamlines the core and removes the compulsory emphasis area requirement in favor of a less prescriptive elective distributions, and highlight optional tracks that are closely aligned with minors
