Rationale

The University of Missouri-St. Louis educates more veterans than any other postsecondary institution in the state. Toward that end, the campus offers a minor in Military and Veterans Studies. However, that curriculum does not specifically address one of the largest problems currently facing the military: sexual abuse. The Certificate in Gender and the Military: • offers a safe place for veterans to discuss sex and gender issues, • provides information that can help alleviate guilt • fosters understanding of military culture, • promotes activism if not a sense of agency, • introduces students to research tools, and • engages them in service-learning/civic engagement experiences that will help them help others. At the same time, the certificate: • educates those who care about or work with veterans regarding the trauma of sexual assault and the military culture which develops and ostensibly condones it, • encourages these students to work toward recognizing and alleviating attitudes and conditions which foster such attitudes, and • teaches them how to support the victims' healing and sense of agency. This certificate will be attractive to an important and currently under-served segment of the community, the university, the state, and the region. It should also help retain current students by making them more marketable, adding depth and breadth to course work leading to careers in Counseling, Gerontology, Trauma Studies, Social Work, Sociology, Nursing, Psychology, Philosophy, Cultural Anthropology, Education, Criminology & Criminal Justice, Veterans' Affairs, and medicine.
