Admission Requirements

Post-Baccalaureate to Doctorate of Nursing Practice

The post-baccalaureate entry point is designed for registered nurses who have completed a Bachelor's of Science in Nursing degree and desire to obtain a doctoral degree in nursing practice as they will develop the knowledge, skills, and expertise to become clinical scholars, transformational leaders, nurse practitioners and to function at the highest level of nursing practice.

The UMSL College of Nursing is committed to admitting a diverse group of students who will become nurse leaders responsive to the specific needs of the communities and populations we serve. We value diversity, intellectual discourse and rigor, caring, professionalism, mutual respect and support, innovation, collaboration, and transparency. Applicant will be selected using inclusive and balanced admission criteria that measure their potential in nursing practice, education, research, and scholarship. We measure our success by graduates who become lifelong learners and leaders in their communities and in the profession of nursing.

Applicants to the BSN-DNP program will be holistically reviewed using criteria such as GPA, a personal statement, an essay, work/volunteer experiences, professional activities, leadership roles, honors, and award recognitions.

All applicants must submit the following materials:

- UMSL application for admission
- Transcripts from all previous institutions
- Two letters of reference
- Evidence of current RN licensure
- BSN-DNP program supplemental application including:

- Personal statement indicating overview of professional experiences, motivation and goals for pursuing a doctoral degree, reasons for selecting specialty focus and short and long-term professional goals (3-4 pages)
- Required essay (directions found in the supplemental application)
- Resume outlining previous education, work/volunteer experience, extracurricular activities, leadership roles, honors and awards

Required Admission Criteria:

Applicants are evaluated based on the following criteria:

- BSN from a nationally accredited nursing program
- BSN 3.3 3.25 GPA (calculated on last 60 hours of BSN coursework)
- Current professional RN licensure
- Completion of an undergraduate general statistics course or Graduate level general statistics course
- Completion of an undergraduate health assessment course or equivalent

Direct Admit Option

Guaranteed admission to the BSN-DNP program is selective and open to students who have earned a BSN from the University of Missouri – St. Louis or completed the UMSL CON Externship in Nursing Summer program and earned a BSN degree from a nationally accredited nursing program. Applicants must have a 3.75 GPA (calculated on last 60 hours of BSN coursework). Once admitted, students must maintain a 3.25 GPA. For full consideration, applications must be submitted by April 1.

Spaces in the BSN-DNP program are limited and are first awarded to guaranteed applicants and awarded to non-guaranteed students on a competitive basis. Non-guaranteed applicants must submit applications no later than April 1 may apply for priority admission before January 15. Based on space available application received no later than April 1 will be reviewed.

Post-Master's Entry with Advanced Practice Nursing Specialty Post-Master's to Doctorate of Nursing Practice

The post master's entry point is designed for nurse practitioners graduateprepared nurses who want to develop the knowledge, skills, and expertise to become clinical scholars, transformational leaders, and function at the highest level of nursing practice while obtaining a terminal degree in nursing practice.

 - Required essay (directions found in the supplemental application)
 - Resume outlining previous education, work/volunteer experience, extracurricular activities, leadership roles, honors, and awards

Required Admission Criteria:

Applicants are evaluated based on the following criteria:

- MSN from a nationally accredited nursing program
- A cumulative GPA of 3.5 on a 4.0 scale for applicants with a master's degree in nursing MSN 3.25 GPA
- Current professional RN licensure
- Completion of an undergraduate general statistics course or Graduate level general statistics course

Post-Master's Entry without Advanced Practice Nursing Specialty

This post-master's entry point is designed for registered nurses who have completed a Master's in Nursing degree but are not prepared or practicing as a nurse practitioner. Likewise, APRNs who want to add an additional specialty may take this entry pathway to the DNP. Individualized plans of study are developed for students in this entry pathway depending upon prior coursework.

Required Admission Criteria

- MSN from a nationally accredited nursing program
- A cumulative GPA of 3.5 on a 4.0 scale for applicants with a master's degree in nursing
- Current professional licensure
- Completion of an undergraduate general statistics course or Graduate level general statistics course
- Completion of an undergraduate health assessment course or equivalent

DNP Application Procedure

All applicants must submit the following materials:

- UMSL application for graduate admission
- Official transcripts from all previously attended colleges and universities
- \$50 nonrefundable application fee
- DNP supplemental application
- Two letters of recommendation.

- A two-page essay, indicating your professional goals and proposed DNP project
- A copy of your Advanced Nursing Practice Document of Recognition (if applicable)
- A copy of your National Advanced Practice Certificate (if applicable)

Application Deadline for Fall Enrollment: April 1 Priority is January 15, April 1, if space is available.
