Career Outlook

Employers report a degree from the humanities is desirable for fields that require analysis, communication, and flexibility including business, banking, libraries, law, foreign service, and public policy. The median income for individuals with a History BA degree is the highest in the liberal arts, with a significant boost in earnings for individuals with an MA in History. A growing interest in local history has created employment opportunities in museum, archival, and preservation work, and the Department of Labor expects jobs in these fields to grow at a faster pace than average over the next decade.
