The BSPPA degree is designed for students who are interested in understanding and influencing public policy and administration, and who have a passion for making a positive impact on society. Students will gain understanding of developing, implementing, and evaluating public policy, and leading in public and nonprofit organizations. Students will have the chance to utilize those skills through an internship. In the public policy track, students work with a faculty advisor to develop a focus on a particular policy area in preparation for relevant jobs in the public, nonprofit or private sector.

Career Outlook

Our students develop practical skills and engage in internships that have helped our graduates secure jobs in local, state, and federal government, and in nonprofit organizations, including positions with the Department of Defense, Department of Veteran's Affairs, Cities of Florissant and Chesterfield, and the Small Business Administration, and the United Way. The Center for State and Local Government Excellence projects that local government employment will grow 7.4% through 2026 and state government employment will grow 3.8%. Nonprofit opportunities are projected to grow even faster.
