This degree prepares students for a career in Art Education; students who successfully complete the program will be eligible for K-12 Art teacher certification in Missouri. Art Education students complete a foundation art program plus additional courses that provide experience with a broad range of studio processes.

Career Outlook

Art Education has been identified by the Missouri Department of Elementary and Secondary Education as an area of critical need. Art is a required subject in Missouri public elementary schools, and visual art is often used to fulfill the Fine Arts credit required for high school graduation. Many high school students wish to major in art. With over 300 art teachers in the greater St. Louis region alone, there is a demand for art teachers in urban, suburban and rural areas statewide each year. Requirements met to obtain Missouri teacher certification can be applied toward certification in other states, although additional qualifications may be required.
