COURSE OBJECTIVES: By the end of the course, students should be able (a) to recognize and use basic linguistic terminology, (b) to analyze the components of language, and (c) to apply linguistic concepts to the analysis of the structure of English in particular. No previous knowledge of foreign languages is required; however, those who have taken foreign languages will be well served by that experience, and the instructor will use many examples from languages other than English in order to explain linguistic concepts.

ATTENDANCE: You are allowed two unexcused absences. One point will be deducted from your final for each unexcused absence beginning with the third. The difference between excused and unexcused will be determined by the judgment of the instructor alone. Religious holidays are obviously excused.

READING ASSIGNMENTS: Reading assignments are listed on the syllabus and you should complete them **before** the class during which the assignment appears on the syllabus.

PROJECT: 15% of the grade will be based on a library project in which students report on the phonetics, phonology, morphology, syntax, and language-external issues surrounding a language other than English, Spanish, French, German, Japanese, or Latin. We will have a sign-up list so that no two people do the same language. Significantly more effort and execution will be expected from graduate students.

TESTS: There will be three tests and a final exam. Make-ups will only be given in the case of a documented emergency. If a scheduled test must be missed, notify me **well in advance** so that alternate arrangements can be made at the testing center.

GRADING: Project 15%; three Tests at 20% each; Final Exam 25%. Ten point scale, 0-2 -, 7-9 +.
