COURSE OBJECTIVES: (a) To understand the workings of morphosyntax (grammar) in both standard and nonstandard English, from a descriptive perspective. (b) To be able to apply these concepts in the analysis of language. (c) To be able to apply your understanding of syntax to the study of literature. The course does not assume that you have any knowledge of a foreign language; however, those who have taken foreign languages will be well served by that experience, and the instructor will use many examples from foreign languages to explain linguistic concepts in English. EN 2810/Traditional Grammar, is a pre-req; students may place out of 2810 by passing the traditional grammar placement exam.
