#### Vocabulary

- Westward Expansion: The 19th century movement of settlers, agriculture and industry into the American West.
- Forced displacement: The involuntary or coerced movement of a person or people away from their home or home region.
- Manifest Destiny: A widely held American cultural belief in the 19th century that American settlers were destined to expand across North America.
- Steamboat: A boat propelled by a steam engine.
- Packet boats: Medium-sized boats designed to transport domestic mail, passenger, and freight.
- Flatboat: A cargo boat with a flat bottom for use in shallow water.
- Bill of lading: A detailed list of a shipment of goods in the form of a receipt given by the carrier to the person consigning the goods..
- **Broadside**: A large sheet of paper printed on only one side. Often advertisements, but they've also been used to announce government proclamations, support social causes, and entertain.
- Santa Fe Trail: An important trade route going between Franklin, Missouri and Santa Fe, New Mexico, used from about 1821 to 1880.

• Boonslick Trail or Boone's Lick Road: An early trail leading from St. Charles, Missouri, to Franklin, Missouri, used heavily in the early 19th century. Connected to Santa Fe Trail.
