# Federal Writers' Project

• Born in Slavery: Slave Narratives from the Federal Writers' Project, 1936 to 1938 contains more than 2,300 first-person accounts of slavery and 500 black-and-white photographs of former slaves. These narratives were collected in the 1930s as part of the Federal Writers' Project (FWP) of the Works Progress Administration, later renamed Work Projects Administration (WPA). The narratives are arranged alphabetically by the state in which the interviews took place and thereunder by the surname of the narrator.
