# RESERCH

In 2022, CWC awarded one Research and Implementation Grant (\$6,000) that will support UMSL faculty in using a Community-based Participatory Research framework to address issues critical to local neighborhoods and municipalities.

# 2022 RESEARCH AND IMPLEMENTATION AWARDEES

Dana Klar, UMSL Psychological Sciences (Child Advocacy Studies) and Dr. Amanda Bequette, UMSL Psychological Sciences (Child Advocacy Studies) will continue to work with The School District of University City after successfully undergoing the Relationship Building Grant last year. Their Research and Implementation project, *Student Unity Enhancing Community*, seeks to (1) enhance community connectedness through the implementation of a community art project and (2) build community ownership and pride through incorporating students and community members into each step of this project from creation to evaluation and dissemination of the results.





CWC awarded one **Relationship-Building Grant (\$1,000)**, which will serve to support University-Community partnerships in exploring interests, developing mutual expectations and identifying research goals.

## **2022 RELATIONSHIP-BUILDING AWARDEE**

Michael Behle, UMSL Department of Art and Design, is partnering with St. Louis Against Sexual Assault on a month-long exhibition of artwork from sexual assault survivors in Gallery210 @FAB. The partnership aims to raise awareness and offer support for the community of sexual assault survivors. Through the resources of Gallery 210@FAB, an exhibition is being planned for the fall of 2023. This gallery show will serve as a keystone to broader concurrent programming ranging from workshops to informational events to expand community awareness of these resources.





# **EXTENSION FACULTY INNOVATION FUND (EFIF)**

CWC launched a new research and innovation opportunity, The Extension Faculty Innovation Fund (EFIF). The goal of EFIF is to enable MU Extension Community Development (CD) faculty to innovate and strengthen their work through small dollar capacity-building grants and facilitated partnerships with MU System academic resources. The EFIF will support new research-based pilot projects, evidencebased improvements on existing programs, engaging partners/stakeholders/researchers for community development field-building, or other innovative community development-focused initiatives. CWC looks forward to receiving applications for this fund in 2023.

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In 2022, CWC focused dialogue efforts in strengthening community connections and partnerships with program alumni as well as those in the UMSL community.

## NLF Think Tank Book Club

#### **JANUARY, APRIL, SEPTEMBER 2022**

The NLF Book Club was created as a branch of the NLF Think Tank for neighborhood leadership alumni to discuss critical topics offered in social justice and communityfocused books. Participants engage in collaborative thinking and robust discussions with the aim to work together on addressing challenges offered in these books. The book club provides an opportunity for neighborhood leaders to connect, network and share knowledge with each other. There were 19 attendees over 3 virtual book club sessions, and CWC sponsored 20-30 additional books per club for alumni who could not attend but still wanted to engage with the book.

Community-Based Participatory **Research Series** 

#### FEBRUARY - APRIL 2022

CWC partnered again with UMSL's Public Policy, Nursing and Economic & Community Development departments to hold a five-part **Community-based Participatory** Research Training Series with a goal of building the capacity of researchers and community stakeholders and to develop long-term, collaborative community partnerships in the St. Louis region.

#### **SESSION TOPICS**

- 1. Academic Research in the Context of Race and Community Focuses on the influence of racism on the performance of academic research and how this effects the work done in the community.
- 2. Basics of CBPR Provides an in-depth understanding of CBPR and how to increase engagement.
- 3. Trust Building Covers research-based practices that build authentic partnerships between university and community for long-term relationships.
- 4. Partnership Connections Explores four guiding principles for universitycommunity collaborations.
- 5. Funding Opportunities Covers communityengaged research grants offered across campus and other entities.

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Neighborhood Leadership Academy

#### **SEPTEMBER – NOVEMBER 2022**

In Fall 2022, Neighborhood Leadership Academy hosted two cohorts, one in-person and one virtual, in order to accommodate different learning styles and allow for higher volume of participants. With both cohorts combined, there were 55 participants from the counties of St. Louis City, St. Louis, Greene, Phelps, Camden, Boone, Jackson County, Johnson, Texas County, Maries, Franklin, Jefferson, Dent, Worth, Osage and St. Clair (IL). Additionally, NLA awarded 39 scholarships, allowing individuals to participate in NLA at no cost and increasing access to individuals across the state looking to acquire skills and knowledge needed to bring positive change in their communities.







#### 2022 NLA graduates shared the following feedback:

"The overall knowledge that I have gained through this course has been amazing. From how to engage stakeholders in the community, to planning events and hosting meetings, these are all tools that I will fully utilize going forward. The clifton strengths evaluation is an invaluable tool I will use in my neighborhood planning efforts, but also my personal life, namely in being more aware of my particular strengths in my workplace and how those strengths can serve me well there."

"Everyone and everything was so amazing. You guys were so phenomenal, fantastic, kind and sincere. Everything learned can be utilized going forward for other community projects/engagement."

"I will share that the program might be one of the best kept secrets when it comes to individuals such as myself who may be wanting to engage but don't know how or where to start."

#### Neighborhood Leadership Academy Mini Grants

#### **NOVEMBER 2022**

NLA awarded mini-grants to a selection of 2022 NLA participants with a goal of ensuring that project ideas become reality and create positive change at the grassroots, neighborhood level. Participants had an opportunity to apply for a maximum of \$2,500. CWC received 31 applications and funded 20 projects across the state through a grant review committee made up of neighborhood leadership alumni. The total amount awarded was \$46,805.



#### New Alumni Interactive Map Tool

With over 532 NLA alumni and over 100 NLF alumni, there is a deep and burgeoning network of leaders around the state. In order to facilitate leaders connecting with each other as well as having the ability for the public to identify and connect with alumni in their communities, we worked with the MU Center for Applied Research and Engagement Systems to develop an interactive NLA/NLF alumni map. Now posted on our CWC website at cwc.umsl.edu, users can filter and sort by location, cohort and topical interest area and connect directly with leaders through an email function.



#### Neighborhood Leadership Fellows

#### **JANUARY – SEPTEMBER 2022**

Neighborhood Leadership Fellows, an advanced leadership program focused on systems change, hosted 18 sessions over 9 months in 2022 and graduated 26 St. Louis Promise Zone resident Fellows. These Fellows learned advocacy skills and strategies needed to gain access to civic leadership tables and halls of power.

#### NLF program outputs:

- Each Fellow created a 10-year Individualized Personal Leadership Plan.
- Fellows worked in groups to develop a policy-focused project aimed at addressing more equitable regional policies for neighborhoods. Groups were tasked with developing or enhancing a policy model/framework based on lived experiences, strengths and networks in addition to performing data research, advocacy and community engagement in order to work towards systematic change that would address an inequity in the Promise Zone.

ST. LOUIS PROMISE ZONE **RESIDENT FELLOWS** 

The groups presented their final projects at the 2022 Graduation Ceremony in September:

- Wealth Warriors Team (Financial Empowerment) Increase wealth in the Promise Zone by mandating the Family Self-Sufficiency Program for those seeking housing assistance.
- Youth First (Youth at the Center) Target needs and services of every child in Pre-K-12 through Full-Service Schools.
- Double Justice Team (Health & Safety) Lift barriers to housing for those with past convictions by implementing "Ban the Box–Housing".
- Neighborhood Crusaders Team (Neighborhoods)

Strengthen Fair Housing Rights for Renters by creating a non-governmental agency as a centralized source for tenants' rights and services.


