

What Do I Do If a Student Needs a Transcript for My Video Lectures?

At some point in your tenure as a faculty member, you may be notified that a student in your course has a visual impairment and will need an accommodation. The message that comes from the Office of Disability Access Services (DAS) reads "In order for our office to assist you in providing the necessary accommodations for this student, our office will need to be provided with accessible links to any audio materials that require processing." I bet your first question is, "What is an accommodation and how do I make my audio/video links accessible to DAS?"

An accommodation is defined as an, "adjustment making a workstation, job, program, facility, or resources accessible to a person with a disability" (p. 65)¹. Basically, every person, regardless of their disability, should have access to every opportunity afforded to the other students in a class. This scares some instructors because they do not know how to help with or accommodate a student who has a disability. There is no need to be afraid. The Office of Disability Access Services exists to help any faculty or student in any way possible in this situation. This includes making your audio/video lectures or YouTube videos accessible to the student who needs this federally-mandated accommodation. Accessibility can take different forms, but with regard to a visual impairment, it may include providing transcripts for course videos or adding alternate text-based descriptions for images and tables for use with screen-readers.

The bottom-line is: DAS will work with you, as the instructor, to inform you of what to do and how to help the student receive what is appropriate to meet the accommodation. This applies to all disabilities. Most of the time we think only of physical disabilities, but on this campus, most of the disabilities are hidden, including afflictions like post-traumatic stress disorder or mental illness.

Regardless of the type, this is an opportunity and not something to be feared.
