Time Management

Anti-Racist Pedagogy

The Center for Teaching and Learning at UMSL does not position itself as an expert in anti-racist pedagogy but instead is part of a larger campus effort of facilitating ways for collective education, conversations and actions towards contributing to a truly diverse, equal, and inclusive campus. This section will focus on anti-racist teaching practices and efforts around campus.

The Columbia University's Center for Teaching Learning has recently compiled a guide called "Anti-Racist Pedagogy in Action:First Steps." Last month we highlighted two resources to address curricular gaps with intentional course design. This series will continue to highlight resources that may be pedagogically useful. The next section of the guide provides resources to address the environment in the classroom.

Columbia University's Inclusive Teaching Guide provides a plethora of resources to foster an inclusive environment in the classroom and online. Principle 1 focuses on ways to establish and support a class climate that fosters belonging for all students.

The CTL has developed a workshop on inclusive teaching based on this guide. - What is it? Confidential online questionnaire administered to students to obtain early feedback on the course. See the questions in the survey before you register.
- Who can see the results? Only the instructor has access to the feedback.
- What are the benefits? Confidential feedback that can be implemented before final course evaluations.
- When can you register? Faculty can register for the mid-semester feedback system now or until registration closes on February 23, 2021.
- When is the survey available to students? The survey is available from 2/24/21 3/11/2021.

Updates from the Office of eLearning at UM-System

This section will highlight news and technology updates from the Office of eLearning.

Kaltura to Panopto Changeover

On June 1, 2021 Kaltura will no longer be available for use, but don't worry - your video content will be moved for you. Since Kaltura and Panopto have developed to have very similar feature sets over the past few years, we will be consolidating all video streaming and lecture capabilities onto Panopto to streamline technologies, support, and budgets.

Though we encourage faculty to switch as soon as possible to Panopto for video creation, Kaltura will remain available for new video creation until February 1, 2021 at which time no more video content can be created or uploaded into Kaltura, although videos can continue to be played throughout the Spring 2021 semester. The Office of

eLearning team at UM-System will be copying all Kaltura videos that have been played at least once within the last two years over to the relevant campus instance of Panopto.

Where I can learn how to use Panopto?

The UM-System Teaching Tools site contains a number of <u>help documents on using Panopto</u> or <u>register to join</u> one of the many workshops or help sessions on Panopto.

Gradescope

All campuses within the University of Missouri System now have a <u>Gradescope</u> license for the Spring 2021 term.

Gradescope makes grading more consistent through horizontal grading and dynamic rubrics. Gradescope supports fully online assignments where no paper is required, paper-based assignments, assignments combining online and paper-based approaches, and computer programming assignments. You can find more information about the support Gradescope offers in this blog post and in this FAQ Guide for delivering remote assessments.

Instructors can use Gradescope in remote, hybrid, and face-to-face courses. <u>Learn</u> <u>about their experience</u> and how easy it is to get started - even in the middle of the term.

You can link Canvas courses and assignments to Gradescope and sync your roster and grades. Learn more on how to leverage the Canvas integration by watching this video.

The Gradescope team will also be hosting <u>weekly workshops</u> at 11 a.m. central on Thursdays. Attending one of these workshops is a great way to get a quick overview of

the platform and learn how to get the most out of Gradescope.

Inscribe

Inscribe creates Q&A communities that allow students, faculty and staff to work together—asking questions, finding answers, and sharing resources. InScribe captures these interactions, and makes them reusable, so each generation benefits from the conversations that came before them.

How can I use Inscribe in teaching?

- Get student questions out of email and into a forum where answers are reusable and available across sections and terms.
- Create channels within a community for more focused groups such as individual classes, topics, or specific audiences.
- You also can establish a community for your entire cohort, degree program, department, or college. The tool allows you to facilitate discussions beyond individual courses.

Hypothes.is

Hypothesis is an open source tool that lets users highlight and annotate any web page or PDF. It can be used with a browser extension or inside your Canvas site.

How can I use Hypothes.is in teaching?

- Have students look up difficult words or unknown allusions in a text and share their research as annotations
- Pre-populate a text with questions for students to reply to in annotations or notes elucidating important points as they read
- Have students highlight, tag, and annotate words or passages that are confusing to them in their readings
- Have students identify formal textual elements and broader social and historical contexts at work in specific passages
- Have students share their personal opinions on a controversial topic as discussed by an article
