

A look back: Focus on Teaching and Technology Conference (FTTC) 2022

This year's Focus on Teaching and Technology Conference, September 29 & 30, featured over 50 virtual sessions attracting 700+ attendees from across the globe. Thursday's Award Winning Teacher Panel (recording linked) showcased 18 faculty sharing strategies and teaching tips. On Friday, Dr. Bryan Dewsbury presented the conference keynote, <u>Power, Practice, and Pedagogy - Classrooms as</u> Spaces for Inclusion and Equity (recording linked) and workshop, On Assessment and Inclusive Classrooms (recording linked). In his keynote, Dewsbury recounted his initial struggles as an undergraduate student from Trinidad and Tobago, unfamiliar with American higher education. His messages shared the perspective of both students and faculty and emphasized the importance of viewing students holistically. "When I think about inclusive classrooms, I don't necessarily think about the subject matter that you discuss," he said. "I don't necessarily think about the grades that you hand out or the textbooks that you read from. I am not saying those things are not important. But I'm seeing the inclusive classroom as one where the individual is free to dream, free to imagine, free to envision various versions of themselves as they look toward the future." Dewsbury shared excellent resources to learn more about inclusive classroom strategies that we list here.

Education: Ph. D. in French Language,
Literature, and Francophone Studies
(2010), Graduate Certificate in Women and
Gender Studies (2010) from Washington
University in St Louis; Teaching Certification
in French and Spanish (2007).
Graziella's research developed in two
directions. Literature and Gender Studies
and Language Education and Cultural
Studies. She spoke publicly and published
on the literary genre of dialogue by French
and Italian women authors of The XVIthCentury-Renaissance, the medical

discourse about women, and the self-representation of the speaking subject of the same period.

Graziella is a multilingual educator focusing on Romance Languages who moved to St Louis in 2000. She came to UMSL with a teaching experience of 20+ years in different institutions, levels of language acquisition, and cultures, one of which was a five-year European-led program in Central America. Graziella taught and designed French and Spanish language, literature, and culture courses such as advanced topics in literature, film, conversation, writing, introduction to language and culture, and cultural gastronomy. She taught in hybrid, online and in-person modalities using current educational technology. She is the recipient of The Kemper Award for Excellence in Teaching (Webster University, 2021), the Honorarium for Excellence in Teaching and Outstanding Service (Webster University, 2020), and The Border Project Grant (Webster University, 2019 and 2022). At UMSL, Graziella teaches French and Spanish from a student-centered approach focusing on proficiency-based language instruction, language awareness, multilingualism,

and inclusion.

Additionally, Graziella serves in professional organizations such as the Women in French and Foreign Language Association of Missouri, where she acts for this term as Conference Chair. She also serves as a promoter of Integral Education with Mindfulness (New Creation International), translation studies and partnership (Red Latina), and as a referee for UMSL Global. This year she serves on her department's Committee for Community and Partnership.

Graziella likes integrating her side interests in travel, cultural gastronomy, and dance into her teaching.

Paula Prouhet joined the College of Nursing in August of 2012 and currently serves as an Associate Teaching Professor and the Accelerated BSN Program Director. Several years into her nursing career, Paula transitioned to the neonatal intensive care unit, where she fell in love with working with premature and medically fragile infants and their families. She then obtained her Ph.D. in nursing from the University of Missouri-Kansas City in 2021 with a research focus on nurses' biases toward families and the impact on family-centered care interventions in the neonatal intensive care unit.

As faculty in the College of Nursing, Paula brings expertise in adult, pediatric, and neonatal intensive care nursing. She teaches various courses across the BSN programs, including pediatrics, health assessment, and pathophysiology. In addition to her teaching and director roles, Paula recently accepted the CTL Faculty Fellow for Student Support Programs. In this new role, she helps support Jenna Alexander, Assistant Director for Student Support Programming, in running the Supplemental Instructor and Active Learning Assistant programs.

You will find Paula spending time with her husband and two dogs outside of

work. She loves to travel, with her favorite trip being to Positano, Italy, where she married her husband in October 2010.

Applications are now open to receive student support through the active learning assistant or supplemental instruction program.

Spring is just around the corner! As you look ahead to next semester, please consider applying for one or both of the <u>student support programs</u> we offer through the Center for Teaching and Learning: the Supplemental Instruction (SI) program and the Active Learning Assistant (ALA) program.

In the SI program, faculty work closely with a student who has taken the course

before and done well. The SI Leader attends class, assists with class activities, and serves as a model student. The SI Leader also holds regular study sessions outside of class for students.

ALAs, are students who meet with faculty members for weekly preparation sessions. These sessions give faculty members opportunities to receive feedback from their ALAs and to brainstorm ways to incorporate more active learning in their courses. Overall, the ALA program supports faculty who strive for instructional innovation.

This event is facilitated by the CTL but features the work of an interdisciplinary group of faculty that are part of the Anti-Racist Educators Group.



Culturally Responsive Teaching

Over the past three years, the Center for Teaching Learning has offered faculty learning communities (FLC) on different topics that arose from the curriculum alignment process (CAP), such as introductory statistics, transparency in learning and teaching, and foundational STEM teaching. A new FLC will launch in January 2023 about culturally responsive teaching.

Dr. Courtney Plotts of the Council for At-Risk Student Education and Professional Standards (CASEPS) recently shared her expertise about culturally responsive teaching with our campus at our Spring Forum of Teaching in 2021 as our keynote speaker. There was a lot of interest in her presentation and workshop, which caused us to pursue a further partnership and offer a faculty learning community about the topic. We are excited to

announce that we will soon be taking applications for a new faculty learning community from January through December 2023.

What? A cohort of 8-12 faculty members will learn from and with each other about what it means to be culturally responsive. <u>Faculty will also be able to achieve a culturally responsive teaching certification from CASEPS.</u>

Who? Faculty from across UMSL in all disciplines and ranks are invited to participate. The faculty learning community (FLC) will be facilitated by CTL Assistant Director Erin Whitteck.

When? The group will meet monthly from January through April 2023. In addition, on June 13-14, all FLC participants will complete a culturally responsive teaching certification through the Council for At-Risk Student Education and Professional Standards (CASEPS), where they will learn about strategies they could implement in their courses. In Fall 2023, participants will again meet monthly through December 2023 to implement culturally responsive strategies in their courses and get feedback from their peers.

How? Meetings will be a mix of virtual and in-person. The CASEPS certification will be in person.

Participants will be compensated for the completion of the program. If you are interested, please register below to start a conversation about the possibilities of this opportunity. Applications will close on November 9th.
